Ceremony for Rev. King on Sept. 30th

ORDINATION RITES
FEATURE SERMONS
BY ASSN. LEADERS

A service of ordination and installation will be conducted for Albert F. King, minister of Bethel Congregational Church on Thursday evening, September 30, at 8 o'clock, under the auspices of the West Willamette Association of Congregational churches and Bethel Church.

The ordination sermon will be preached by the Rev. Frank E. Carlson, comptroller and member of the faculty of Pacific School of Religion from which Mr. King was graduated on June 11, 1948. The prayer of ordination will be offered by the Rev. Paul A. Davies, superintendent of the Oregon Conference of Congregational Churches. The Rev. Elmer D. Nourse of Hillsboro, Moderator of the West Willamette Association will make the declaration of the office conferred.

The Ecclesiastical Council which will examine Mr. King as a candidate for ordination, hear his statement of faith, and formally approve his ordination will meet at 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon, following which the members will be served dinner by a committee from the Women's Fellowship of Bethel Church.

Ernest G. Webb is chairman of committee in charge of preparations for the ordination. Serving with him are Miss Amarette Barnes, Joseph Bates, Willis Cady, and Mrs. Milton Metcalfe. Miss Barnes will direct a group of girls from Bethel Church Pilgrim Fellowship in serving light refreshments following the service. All who attend are invited to remain for this social hour to meet Mr. and Mrs. King and the out-of-town guests who will participate.

Representatives from ten Portland Congregational churches will attend as well as guests from the Congregational churches of Clackamas, Oswego, St. Helens, Scappoose, Oregon City and Jennings Lodge.

Other ministers who will take part in the service include the Rev. Raymond E. Walker, First Congregational Church of Portland; the Rev. Paul G. Dickey, Parkrose Congregational Church; the Rev. William H. Genne, Pacific University; and the Rev. Thomas McCamant of Waverly Heights Congregational Church of Portland.

Willis Cady will direct the choir in singing the Gloria in Excelsis by Mozart and the traditional response to the prayer of ordination, "Blessed is He who Cometh in the Name of the Lord" by Gounod.

JCC Effort Against Fire Starts Oct. 4

ORGANIZATION IN
ORE. COMPETITION
SETS UP PROGRAM

Entering a statewide contest being conducted by the Oregon State Junior Chamber of Commerce, Beaverton JCC's will begin a comprehensive campaign, October 4, to bring home to the people of the community the need for measures of fire prevention, reports Chet Hunkapillar, president of the local group. Kickoff of the campaign will feature the bombing of Beaverton, from the air, with leaflets carrying the message of fire prevention. This will take place on Monday and Thursday noon.

Also, on Monday, the Jaycees, will assist Beaverton firemen in testing, cleaning and greasing all fire plugs. In addition, hydrants will be painted bright red.

On Friday, a program will be presented at the Beaverton high school, on the topic of controlling losses through fire.

Under the direction of Tom Fohl, member of the group who is a professional fire insurance special agent, inspection will be made of all business houses and plants in Beaverton. Home owners who desire to know whether or not they have fire hazards may also be inspected, upon request.

A dinner will be held on Monday night, at which all firemen and fire insurance agents of Beaverton will be invited to explore means of strengthening fire prevention methods and seeking some way to lower present fire insurance rates.

The local campaign, under the sponsorship of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, is being conducted with the cooperation of the Beaverton and BRFPD firemen.

Death Concludes Colorful Career Wm. Zimbrick

Funeral services will be held on Thursday, September 30 at Peggs Chapel, Beaverton, for William Zimbrick, 80, who passed away suddenly at his home, 1615 S. W. First, Street, Portland, September 27. He had lived in the vicinity of Portland for the past 45 years.

Born on January 1, 1869 in Wisconsin, Mr. Zimbrick was a colorful career, outstanding in the courage by which he overcame serious handicap.

When he was 21 years of age, at the celebration in Park Rapids, Minnesota, which signalled the entry of the railroad into town, he was delegated to help shoot off the cannon. A blowback on the explosion blew off both arms of Zimbrick and another young man.

In spite of his infirmity, Mr. Zimbrick took out a homestead, then made his living as a business man and salesman. Although one arm was off at the shoulder and the other at the elbow, he regularly went hunting and lived as normally as he could. He did nearly all his daily tasks without assistance, such as dressing, eating and writing.

He was the brother of John Zimbrick of Kalama, Wash., Otto Zimbrick, of Scholls and Mrs. Frances Peterson of Los Angeles. Among numerous nieces and nephews are Frank Zimbrick, Archie Zimbrick and Mrs. Freda Amie all of Beaverton; Matt Zimbrick, Willamina, Oregon; Mrs. Laura Emmons, formerly of Beaverton and now in Eugene and Mrs. Ellen LaForge, Lebanon. Reverend George Springer will officiate at the funeral rites.

Vault interment will be in Crescent Grove cemetery.

Winner in a lop-sided game with West Linn of last week, Beaverton's eleven served notice on other TYV teams that they intend to be counted in this year's race. Victor in only one game, with Tillamook last year, the green aggregation of 1947 was subject to much pushing around by other league teams.

This year, in their first game with Seaside, the Beavers tasted the first fruits of victory, 18-12. Last week, against West Linn, the local gridmen unleashed a powerful ground and air attack to rock their opponents to the tune of 33-0.

Mobile X-ray Count Beats Record Mark at Beaverton

TUESDAY EXAMINATIONS REACH 482; DRIVE TOTAL SURPASSES FIGURE OF 396 IN 1947

Response in Beaverton, Tuesday September 28, during the Mobile X-Ray unit visit, surpasses all records for chest examinations, according to Mrs. Vern Hoaglin, chairman, who reports a total of 482 in comparison to 1947's high mark of 396. The Beaverton Business and Professional Women's Club sponsored the examination and headquarters were maintained at the Legion Hall on Washington.

An annual campaign which is part of the Washington County Public Health Association's fight to eradicate tuberculosis by finding its incidence early enough to effect curative treatment, the Mobile Unit is financed by sale of Christmas seals. Last year's drive was held on December 13.

At the conclusion of the county drive on October 11, notices of retakes will go out for cases that require further study. Reasons for a retake, however, do not always mean infection.

Sometimes mechanical failure of equipment or improper position of the patient during his X-Ray exposure will result in a blurred or inadequate film. Rather than assume the reason, the health association offers a re-take to establish the fact.

All retakes are of a confidential nature, regardless of why they are requested. The only person to whom positive reactions are revealed, other than the patient, is his family physician.
