

Canada Asks for Applicants--War Duty Gratuities

More than 1800 U. S. citizens, veterans of RCAF, have yet to apply for their Canadian "War Service Gratuity", based on World War II service with Royal Canadian Air Force.

Repeated attempts by Canadian government have failed to locate some former servicemen of next-of-kin eligible for gratuity.

War Service Gratuity is based on \$7.50 for every 30 days' service in RCAF pays extra 25 cents a day for overseas service, plus

additional amount for each six months overseas equal to seven days' pay and allowance based on rank at discharge.

Eligible veterans or next-of-kin including widow, children, parents, brothers or sisters, should apply to The Air Member, Canadian Joint Staff, 1760 N. St., NW, Washington 6, D.C.

Photostatic or certified copy of RCAF discharge, if available, should accompany application or identifying data should include serviceman's full name, RCAF rank, serial number, dates of enlistment and discharge, or transfer to U. S. forces. Next-of-kin should include name, address, and relationship to serviceman.
