New Cedar Mill Church Readies Dedication Oct. 3

The congregation of the Cedar Mill Community Church will begin its services in the new Educational Building at the corner of N. W. Cornell Road and Church Street, 12208 N. W. Cornell Road, next Sunday, October 3 with a Dedication Service at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

The regular Sunday School Hour will be held at 9:45 a.m. with the Morning Service at 11 o'clock in the new building, as well as the Young People's Hour at 7 p.m. and the Evening Service at 7:45 p.m.

Two former pastors, Rev. Forrest "Forbes" of Boring, Oregon and Rev. Daniel Hager of the Baptists; Church of Roswell, Idaho will share in the Dedication Service states Rev. Simon E. Forsberg, Minister.

The building is a one story shake frame building with full basement, and second story rooms in the rear portion. The main auditorium on the first floor seats 220 and is buttressed with laminated arches. In addition there is a Mothers' Room, four Sunday School rooms and lavatories on the main floor.

The basement has an auditorium seating 220, likewise to be used as a fellowship hall. With it is a kitchen, four more Sunday School rooms, a utility room and a heating plant.

The second floor in the rear of the church consists of a large class room and library, together with an added pastor's study. Two fireplaces are available for Young People's Services.

The work on the building was begun last summer, and has been conducted in great measure by the use of free labor. While the Church organization is denominationally unrelated, it is a member of the National Association of
