PGE Constructs New Outlets for Electric Power

Portland General Electric Company's current \$1,365,000 program of additional interconnections with lines of the Bonneville system will be fairly well completed by April of next year, James H. Polhemus, president of PGE said this week.

Start of construction on the \$800,000 interconnection at Troutdale is being made this week and when completed next spring will add 180,000 kilowatts of capacity to the PGE system. Another interconnection now being constructed by PGE at St. Marys near Beaverton will be completed this fall at a cost of about \$365,000 adding capacity up to 32,000 kilowatts.

Completed earlier this year, the St. Louis interconnection near Woodburn added 8,000 kilowatts of capacity at a cost of more than \$200,000.

The Troutdale interconnection will be the seventh electrical tie to be made between PGE lines and those of the Bonneville Power Administration. Others exist at St. Johns in Portland, Harborton, Salem and West Salem.

The combined capacity of 425,000 kilowatts furnished by these connections will allow ample power to flow into the PGE system from federal hydroelectric plants on the Columbia river to provide for recent increase in electrical load and a substantial margin for future development of the lower Willamette and Tualatin Valley regions. Polhemus said.

Comic Books Hit In Censor Move By 4 Drug Stores

Wearied at the atrocities depicted in some comic books and concerned over the wrongful influence such publications exert on the minds of youthful readers, four drug stores in the Beaverton area have agreed among themselves to establish a voluntary censorship on the books that they offer for sale, according to Mitz Alexander, of Canyon Drug in Haskell Center.

"It is simply a matter," declared Alexander, "of our not wanting the responsibility of contributing even more to the imagination of the kids. In my case, I have instructed my employees to cull out the more atrocious comic books. We feel it is up to individual magazine distributors to exercise some judgement in the type of publications offered for sale."

R. Wallace Boyd, of the Beaverton Pharmacy, points out that the state druggist association has recommended the action but that his firm will supplement the suggestion with strict enforcement.

Stores taking part in the voluntary examination of comic books before putting them on sale, in the Beaverton area, are West Slope Pharmacy, Dean's Drug, Canyon Road Drugs and Beaverton Pharmacy.

The plan has likewise received endorsement among many groups in the state.

Beaverton Junior Chamber Urges Prevention of Fires

WEEK'S CAMPAIGN LISTS MANY ACTIVITIES
TO STRESS DANGERS FROM CARELESSNESS

Carrying on an active, intensive campaign to bring home to the people of Beaverton the message of fire prevention during the national week from October 3 to 9, the Beaverton Junior Chamber of Commerce lists a complete campaign to alert local residents to the many dangers Carelessness can cause—in terms of lives and property.

Start of the week's campaign on Monday, began with distribution of fire prevention posters and fire inspection blanks, to merchants and plants of the area. Home fire inspection blanks were also distributed at the Beaverton schools, for all students to take home and return.

At noon, on Monday, Beaverton and surrounding areas were "bombed" with fire prevention leaflets. "Crimes of Carelessness", a fire prevention film, was exhibited at the local theater, before the main feature, that evening.

A "Kickoff" banquet, honoring Beaverton volunteer firemen, and local insurance agents, was held in the American Legion hall, on Washington street.

Tuesday, in addition to a short subject fire prevention film at the Beaver theater, pamphlets entitled "Sixty Ways to Prevent Fire" were handed out at the showhouse entrance. In cooperation with the volunteer fire department, members of the Chamber flushed all hydrants and standpipes, greased caps and checked water main valves.

On Wednesday, home inspection blanks were collected from the schools. More prevention leaflets were distributed at the local theater entrance and another short subject film on fire prevention was exhibited.

Fire department hydrants and standpipes were painted a brilliant yellow by Jaycees, in cooperation with members of the volunteer fire department.

Thursday noon, another leaflet bombing will take place, from the air, in cooperation with Chadwick's Aircraft Sales and Flight Service over the Beaverton area. In the afternoon, all schools will participate in fire drills, to be conducted by Jaycees and firemen. The evening theater bill will include another short subject feature dealing with fire prevention.

On Friday, members of the Junior Chamber will appear with two films, at the Beaverton high school, and also introduce a representative of the Portland Fire Department and Beaverton's Fire Chief, Archie Olson. Films will be, "Texas City Returns" and "The Frying Pan Fire". The public is invited to attend, 12:30 p.m. Friday evening, the local theater will again cooperate, by showing a fire prevention short subject film.

Saturday's schedule will include the collection of fire prevention blanks from merchants. Furthermore, recommendations on reduction of fire insurance rates and suggestions on proper steps for prevention of fire damage will be

made. The campaign ends, that night, at the Beaver theater, where another fire prevention film will be presented by the Junior Chamber.

Chairman of the fire prevention campaign is Jaycee Tom Fohl, who, with active assistance of Chet Hunkapillar, Bruce McMahon, Don Jenkins and other members of the organization, planned and executed the project.

The Beaverton campaign is being conducted in competition with all Junior Chamber of Commerce groups in the state, with an award to be made by the most outstanding job of telling the story of fire prevention.

Portland BPWC has bid the local group to join in a banquet set for the Congress Hotel, October 14. Guest speaker will be Senator Guy Cordon.

Fire Truck Has Two Way Radio Ready for Use

Using the call letters KWNF, Beaverton Rural Fire Protection district has a two-way, Motorola radio phone installed and ready for use on truck number 2, the city hall announces, this week. There is only one other radio phone in use by a county fire department, at Hillsboro, which operates as station KGVG.

Plan, it is said, is to have a receiving set at the city hall to work in conjunction with the fire truck sending set and so enable the direction of as much equipment as is needed at any particular blaze.

Also newly installed, on truck No. 1, is a high pressure pump, which will serve to strengthen the pressure of hose lines.

OBSERVANCE SETS
WEEK TO EMPLOY
WAR CASUALTIES

Whereas military victory in the last war resulted in more than 2,000,000 American casualties on the battlefronts and many times that number in supporting factories and mines, forest and fields, and

Whereas, the great majority of the military and war plant casualties subsequently found useful jobs on the industrial fronts where their remaining abilities were needed, and

Whereas, all of these persons including those most recently discharged from hospitals—or not yet released throughout the land—not only deserve but also are qualified to hold jobs leading to self-support, self-respect and community prestige because of their ultimate contributions as useful citizens of Beaverton, Oregon and the nation.

Now, therefore, I, PAUL H. KNEPP, Mayor of Beaverton do join with all Oregon mayors, Governor John Hall and President Truman in setting aside October 3 to 9 as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week".

I call upon all local officials, employers, civic organizations and all local citizens to assist in every way possible to accomplish the following objectives:

1. To promote employer acceptance of men and women with impairments as workers in jobs for which they have been prepared and for which they are qualified.
2. To find jobs for all qualified handicapped persons now unemployed locally.
3. To effect better job adjustments for those handicapped workers here who are capable of fulfilling more responsible assignments.

4. To develop rehabilitation, training and job opportunities for local handicapped persons who can be made employable.

I further urge local employers to place all their job orders with the Oregon State Employment Service, so that disabled veterans and civilians may be given an opportunity to prove their value in productive jobs for the good of themselves, their dependents and their community.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of Beaverton to be affixed.

THIRD TYV LEAGUE GAME SEES CHANCE OF
UPSET AS VIKINGS TRY FOR 1ST VICTORY

Playing its third TYV league game of the season at 8 p.m., in Forest Grove, against the cellar-dwelling Forest Grove Vikings, October 8, Beaverton high school will seek to redeem a surprise defeat handed them last week by McMinnville high on the home grounds.

Although Forest Grove has been defeated in two league games, they have displayed flashes of power. Against Oregon City, the Vikings rolled up 12 first downs to the Pioneers' 6, though the final score was 13-0 in favor of Oregon City, because of intercepted passes.

Beaverton Drops Two Close Games Of Flag Football

The Beaverton Grade School flag football team has lost its first two games by close scores. The players are hoping to pick up the first victory when they play at Hillsboro this Friday.

The first game played resulted in a victory for Tigard by a score of eight to seven. Tigard's score came as a result of a long touchdown pass in the first half and a safety in the second half. Beaverton's touchdown was scored by Chris Poppert on a right end run.

In a game played with Cornelius at Beaverton on October 1, Beaverton was defeated by a score of 13-6. Beaverton scored first when Harry Shaw ran around right end in the last minute of the first half. Cornelius scored twice in the second half, once on a long pass and once on an end run.

Beaverton Unit Nazarene Church Makes 40th Year

The Beaverton Church of the Nazarene, Leonard C. Johnson, pastor, which was organized on April 14, 1926, will join in a churchwide celebration of the 40th anniversary of the church's organization as a protestant denomination.

At the time of its beginning, in 1908, the church boasted 10,000 members scattered throughout 228 churches, with a few missionaries in foreign areas. Then, Sunday School enrollment was about 6,000 with total giving of the church at \$140,000.

Forty years later, the church membership has reached 210,000 in 3,350 churches, with nearly 200 missionaries in the foreign field. Sunday School enrollment has hit 400,000 and total giving set a mark of \$44,000,000, a per capita for the year of \$90.28.
