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Cedar Mill Unit Of Comm. Church Has Dedication

Dedicatory services for the first unit in its new church plant at N. W. Cornell Road and Church street were held Sunday after-noon at 3 p.m. The Rev. Simon E. Forsberg, minister for the church was chairman for the ceremony.

Sharing in services for the dedication were three ministers including: Rev. Forrest Forbes, a former pastor, now associated with the Word of Life hour; Rev. Daniel Hager of the Baptist church of Roswell, Idaho, also a former pastor and Rev. Horace Wiley, former pastor of the Cedar Mill Congregational church.

Musical selections were played by Miss Patricia Heinrichs at the piano. Special music included a vocal solo, "The Holy City" sung by Robert Saunders and a dedication hymn sung by Miss Evangelina Moshofsky, author of which was Mrs. W. J. Fraser.

The building is a frame construction with shakes in the form of an "L" 85 ft. by 50 ft. The base 35 feet deep and the width of the "L" is 30 ft. Included in the structure are nine Sunday School rooms, a mothers room, a pastors study, an auditorium seating 220, and a fellowship hall seating 200. The estimated value when completed will be \$40,000.

Donald W. Edmundson, A.I.A., is the architect. Property on which the church stands was a gift of the W. I. Heinrichs. Three pianos and an organ have been donated as well as labor, many materials and finances.

Cedar Mill was founded by Elam Young in 1848 when he established a sawmill on Cedar Creek among large stands of timber. The settlers worshipped God in their cabins from 1852. The first church building was erected in 1865. In 1891 it was replaced by the present building, a picturesque example of our rural churches. The present congregation has perpetuated the original name in this third building and it has been incorporated and reorganized in its present basis of operation.

A noteworthy coincidence is the 17th anniversary of the marriage of Rev. and Mrs. Simon E. Forsberg, which fell during the time of the dedication.

History of Beaverton

This community was probably named Beaverton because of the great number of beavers which made their homes on Beaver Dam Creek which still runs along the outskirts of Beaverton.

It was incorporated as a city on February 10, 1893 with Dr. Robinson as its first mayor. He was followed by Mr. Earl Fisher. Dr. Robinson was a practicing physician and also ran a drugstore where the bakery is now located. In those days there were no hard surfaced roads. In summer, the roads were covered with a foot of dust while in winter it was a common sight to see wagons mired to the hubs in two feet of mud.

Some of the earliest settlers in Beaverton were the Hunters, the Wattses, the Rossi's, the Hocken family, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher, the Peggs, the Stotts, the Davies family, the Fanno's, Mr. Thyng, the Classens and Dr. Robinson.

Several of the old buildings are still standing. Among these are

the library building and Grange Hall.

The first school building here was probably the one-room structure located just south of the present Security Bank site. In 1877-78 Della Allen, who later married Earl Fisher, taught all eight grades in this building. Earl Fisher was another of Beaverton's early teachers. In 1894 L. R. Traver came as principal and a three room school was erected where the Safeway is now being constructed.

Due to the growth of Beaverton a larger building was necessary. A four room structure was built east of the present high school. With several additions this served until 1938 when the present grade school was first occupied. At present there are twenty-two classroom teachers with only nineteen classrooms in this building. Every room is overcrowded so we are looking forward to the completion of the new building. It is being constructed on Center Street in northeast Beaverton.

There has been a Canyon Road for many years. Before the automobile this was of the "punchon" type in certain places. There was a "Red Car Line" which ran daily on the S. P. between Portland and Beaverton from 1914 to 1928.

One of the earliest churches in Beaverton was the Congregational Church. These people first met in the building now known as the Church of the Nazarene.

In 1885 a Methodist Church was erected at 4th and Watson. On this same lot the present structure was built in 1910. In 1913 St. Cecilia Church and school was moved to its present location from Cedar Mill. The first Church of Christ building was erected at 2nd and Main in 1917. The date on the cornerstone of the present structure is 1925.

The first newspaper published in Beaverton was called "The Owl". Mr. Earl Fisher was the publisher. In 1927 Mr. H. H. Jeffries established the "Beaverton Enterprise" which he sold to Stanley Netherthorn, the present editor, about two years ago.

This information has been collected by the pupils in Mrs. Bourquin's sixth grade, in interviews with various citizens of our town. We also learned many interesting facts when our principal, Miss Merle Davies, talked to us on "Early Beaverton". We are especially grateful to Mr. Earl Fisher, Mrs. Rossi, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Jeffries, Mrs. Henry Mayfield and the City Hall personnel for their cooperation.

Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Gallagher have moved from their home to Ocean Lake to be near a business site which they have purchased.

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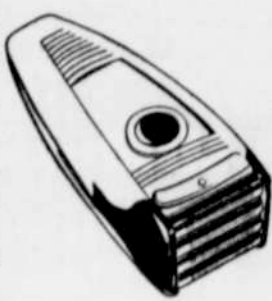
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
