## Mystery Blast Rocks Building Of Peter B. Case

A mysterious explosion, of unknown cause, rocked the building of the Peter B. Case Equipment company, Beaverton, a week ago last Monday. Although no serious damage was done, the blast stirred a ripple of excitement within the building and among neighbors.

Post mortem huddles, trying to trace the probable cause, pointed to the possibility of a gas main leak that had accumulated and was set off by a welding torch. Against that contention, which Mr. Case admitted sounded as good as any idea he had on it, was the fact that the welding torch was being used at least 30 feet from the scene of the explosion.

The concussion lifted segments of the concrete floor up and scattered a few whirlpools of dust. Probably because heavy equipment was standing on the floor, the explosion merely followed old cracks rather than concentrate its push in one place.

The gas company, giving the once-over to the gas main in front of the building, reported no hookup of gas lines.

### THE ONE . . . THAT PICKS 'EM OFF

#### BEAVERTON FIASCO

In the McMinnville-Beaverton play, the first half of the Beaverton eleven seemed like a fiasco. Disastrous fumble in the first quarter gave the visitors a first touchdown, converted to read 7-0. In the second quarter, McMinnville stepped up the tempo. Second touchdown was set-up by

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Johnson's 30 yard run where LeRoy took it over. Point failed, score 13-0. Next, a lateral pass to White established another touchdown, score 19-0.

In the third quarter, yet another fumble by Beaverton, which McMinnville recovered on the Beaverton 8 yard line was a fore-runner to its 25 point total.

The Beavers started to click in the third quarter with the ball on McMinnville's 2 1/2 yard line at the end of the quarter. Zahler took it over at the start of the fourth. Little Jimmy Tsugawa put into the game during the 4th quarter, scattered across from the 5 yard line and Zahler made the point, for the final score of 25-13. McMinnville's most impressive play, from which most of the ground was gained, seemed to be a cross buck through the line, a strategy which Beaverton couldn't manage to overcome.

Beaverton's shining star, thru-out most of the game was "Bud" Cox, halfback, who figured in practically all of the defensive pile-ups as well as offensively. Tsugawa, Mulhausen and Oldenburg had moments of glory, too.

#### WE REMEMBER SUNDAY

If you remember Sunday . . . it was the first one in the 1948 hunting season and in many quarters the infectious deer fever had found its mark. And the hunting grounds around Western Oregon verified the statement that most everyone had a yen for a venison steak or roast.

CUE BALL, whose strenuous week-in and week-out tasks concern the hurdling of a set of typewriter keys, fell victim to the urge. This account is in memory of that occasion.

We were roughly awakened about 4 a.m., at Vernonia, and took off with three companions to the Oregon-American burn, beyond the little town of Timber. We were outfitted with a cannon-piece, size 30.06, rain clothes and

hunting knife (all borrowed, red hat, "bald-face" shoes and hunting license (not borrowed)).

After passing at least 300 cars of other hunters, we stopped near the North Fork of Salmonberry creek scene of a logging operation, and scanned a ridge about one-half mile away. . . lineal measure.

While we watched, a big, beautiful buck ran madly into a clearing. This was incentive enough for two of us and we slid, jumped and half-rolled a slope that averaged 45 degrees for a good quarter mile.

One of the hunters made the contact and bagged a beautiful 3-point, with a one-shot blast through the ear. Dressed out, it weighed about 190 pounds, a big, beautiful trophy.

If you can realize what a job carrying out the carcass proved to be, with four men hauling it 5, 10 or 20 feet at a hitch, up such a canyon, you can realize how even the prospect of a couple of venison meals somehow grows less and less desirable. It took 3 1/2 hours to maneuver the beast to the road.

But, if any reader is interested in getting a nice fat buck, CUE BALL can safely recommend the area noted. We know there is at least one more, down there, ready for the taking. . . and the carrying out. The area had been closed for about 5 years and on Sunday there were at least five carcasses noted, along the roadway.

And if you get your deer, you'll well remember the occasion. At least, we remember Sunday!

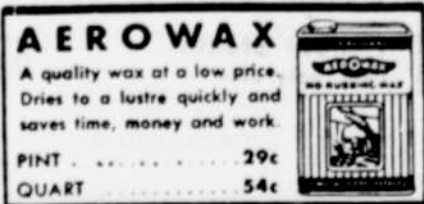
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
