Half of Oregon Auto Smashups In Night Traffic

Almost half of Oregon's fatal traffic accidents are taking place on weekends, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has revealed.

Saturday is the leading death day with Sunday a close second on the basis of state-wide accident reports. Together, these two days accounted for 77 of the 159 fatal smash-ups reported in the first six months of 1948, Newbry said.

Leading factors accounting for this ratio were said to be heavy weekend travel and more after-dark driving at that time.

"This is something motorists enroute to football games must keep in mind," Newbry warned. "Darkness, often heightened by rain, doubles the traffic hazard after the game."

With the number of cars on the road now at record levels, he said a wary eye on traffic, road surface conditions, and the speedometer will help to offset the added danger.
