## Beaverton's Masonic Lodge Met Acid Test in Big Fire

LODGE ORGANIZED IN 1891 BY GROUP OF PIONEER MEMBERS; DISASTER HIT 1894

During the middle eighties and down to 1890, a number of pioneer Masons in the Beaverton vicinity, William and Thomas Tucker, J. N. Fisher, G. W. Stitt, W. D. Fenton, Jack De Letts, W. L. Pike, Dr. F. M. Robinson and others were in the habit of driving with horse and wagon by night to Hillsboro to attend Masonic Lodge at Tuality No. 6. In those days this was a long trip in winter time over muddy roads. Oftentimes the old timers would not get home until two or three o'clock in the morning.

In 1891 the Masons at Beaverton decided to organize a Masonic Lodge at home. They obtained a charter and elected Dr. F. M. Robinson first Worshipful Master.

They secured the second floor of the Squire's building at the corner of Hall and Broadway upstairs over Paul and Company's drug store for a lodge hall. Edward Thomas was the first to be made a Mason at No. 100, and the membership continued to grow.

About 11:30 p.m. August 13, 1894, fire broke out in the Joe Roundy saloon building next door to the lodge hall. J. N. Fisher and a boy were among the first to arrive at the scene of the fire. Fisher climbed the back stairs to the hall and looked into the rear window. It was all on fire inside. It was impossible to save any of the lodge property.

The front door of the drug store downstairs was crashed with a big timber by several men who had arrived by that time. Someone was ringing the old Congregational Church bell and in a few minutes a large crowd had gathered. They were able to remove some of the glass showcases with their contents before the ceiling inside burst into flames. Roundy's saloon was insured but Paul's drug

store was a big loss. The policy had expired only a few days before. The drug store was the property of F. C. Paul and George Stoddard, a cousin of Dr. Robinson.

Everything in the Masonic hall went up in smoke. The charter, however, was not there and it escaped. But Masonry in Beaverton did not perish. New quarters were secured in the Grange Hall. Other lodges of Oregon came to the assistance of the local lodge and in a short time these old pioneer Masons were holding meetings in new quarters. Grange Hall, Morse Hall, Cady Hall and before long in the new Masonic Temple at First and Watson.
