On behalf of the Washington County Tuberculosis and Health Association, I wish to thank you and your staff for the nice piece of publicity which the Enterprise gave us and the Business and Professional Women's Club of Beaverton on and before the Mobile Chest X-Ray survey there on September 28th.

Our records show that 482 miniature X-rays were taken in Beaverton and a total of 3361 taken in Washington County. Of this number 72 were called back for large 14" x 17" X-rays.
