Vets Spur State Vocation School Klamath Falls

Oregon Vocational school at Klamath Falls has grown in 15 months from two classes and 35 students to an institution which today numbers approximately 500 men and women in 29 varied courses of craft and business training. Ninety percent are World War II veterans and half of them are married.

This was reported by O. I. Paulson, state director of vocational education, to the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs this week following the completion of 15 months of successful operation of the state's newest and biggest vocational school.

Growth of the school has been 25 per cent more than was anticipated, Paulson said. Experts predicted that about 400 would enroll in the first year of operations and 500-odd the second year. The school budget was set up on this estimate. Paulson said he expects enrollment in the second year to exceed 600, judging from current growth.

Winston D. Purvine, the school director, reported that the 421 veterans enrolled on September 30 exceed non-veterans by a ratio of nine to one. Forty-nine veterans had graduated as of that date.

The peak enrollment, Purvine said, was last April 15, when 515 students were reported in the average daily attendance.

Most popular courses at Klamath Falls are diesel mechanics, auto mechanics, auto body and fender repair, gunsmithing and refrigeration.

About 80 percent of the students live in school operated housing, at rates from \$53 to \$57 per month for room and board, and \$24 to \$39 for apartments for married veterans. All the 180 apartments are currently filled.

Insecticide Fog Cleans Pac. Int'l Livestock Bldgs.

Declared to be one of the most effective treatments ever known in the history of the exposition, Pacific International Livestock show managers showed high enthusiasm over the insecticide fog service which cleaned up buildings and livestock pens prior to the recent annual P-I exposition, declares R. P. Shannon, route 2, Portland, whose Columbia-Pacific Fog Equipment company handled the job.

Known as the TIFA process, the application of insecticide by the Columbia-Pacific method breaks it down into a dry fog that blankets a wide area and covers building surfaces evenly and completely. It leaves an invisible film on interior surfaces and is being proclaimed as an outstanding success in the controlling of pest-menaced areas.

Shannon reports that TIFA is applicable to homes, orchards and other crops as well as in barns and livestock pens. At present, his company is working with Miller Products, Portland entomologists, on a formula for walnut blight.

For the TIFA method, a different formula is required than for spray and dusting methods. A higher concentration but less quantity of insecticide is required.
