

City Selects Mayor and 2 For Council

FIELD OF 6 WILL FACE ELIMINATION NOV. 2 BALLOTING

Simultaneously with the selection of national, state and county officials, November 2, Beaverton voters will also designate a mayor for two years and two councilmen for terms of four years.

Candidates certified for the city ballot include: for mayor, Wally Ehler, Morgan Cook and Henry H. Jeffries. For councilmen, candidates are Paul Taggart, Jack Weiby and Garn Norris.

Wallace J. "Wally" Ehler, candidate for mayor, 1085 S. Lombard, has lived in Beaverton for 18 years and is a property owner. He has been a member of the Kiwanis for three years and was commander of the local American Legion post 1947-48, in which position he was instrumental in organizing the Legion's building program. He is employed at the Oregon Brass Works.

"My reason for filing," Ehler declares, "is a desire to see the further development of Beaverton as a fine place to live. I want to see immediate action taken on the sewer issue."

Morgan Cook, 42, 1251 S. E. Lombard, mayor candidate, has lived in Beaverton for the last two years but for 15 years previously had been in and out of the town.

Since his return from 3 years service in the wartime Navy, he has been employed as radio engineer for station KEX plus a radio business in Beaverton.

"If elected," Cook states, "it will be my sincere purpose to give Beaverton honest, active leadership, the efficient and prompt carrying out of those measures which will make our city the beautiful and progressive place which is its right."

Henry H. Jeffries, 60, is a realtor and property owner, candidate for the office of mayor. Mr. Jeffries has resided in Beaverton since 1926, when he founded the Beaverton Enterprise, which he operated for about 18 years.

Well versed in the potentialities of Beaverton, he is deeply interested in its development. But his insistence is on the need for sound business administration of the city's affairs.

"I believe in honesty, efficiency and full value for the tax dollar," he declares. "Taxes for 1948 have reached an alarming figure and the need, as I see it, is for sound administration of the problems of development."

Paul Taggart, Beaverton builder, is a resident and property owner and now serves by appointment as a member of the city council. He seeks to win one of the two positions to be filled, for a four year term.

Jack Weiby, 26, married, with one child, whose home is at 650 S. E. 13th St., Beaverton, graduated from Portland University and served 3 1/2 years with the U. S. Navy during the recent war. He believes in Beaverton and its progress.

Garnold Norris, 34, owns a home at the corner of 1st and Tucker, is married and has three children. He is a former member of the Beaverton fire department, is on the executive board of the PTA and an active member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He believes in the potential growth of Beaverton and wants to contribute to its development.

FIVE CANDIDATES VIE FOR OFFICES AT GEN. ELECTION

Subject to the general election of November 2, Washington County Democratic Party enters the political field with five candidates vying for office out of eight county races. During the May Primary, the Democrats were not entered in any county race and were thus assured a place on the general election ballot.

For the position of state senator is Lyman Ross, Democratic candidate who was born in North Dakota and came to Washington county in 1921. Married, with three grown children, Mr. Ross has wide business and farming experience. He owns and operates the Ross Hatchery and Poultry Farm and the Aloha Realty Co. at Aloha. Active in Farmers Union, Grange and other civic organizations, he was a member of the state legislature, 1935, and state senator 1937 and 1939.

One of the two races for state representative is challenged by Robert L. Melquist, Democrat. He was born and raised in Hillsboro. A young man, he is business manager for the AFL at Hillsboro. No Democratic candidate is listed for the other representative post.

No Demo is entered in the races for district attorney for the county, county clerk or county assessor.

C. R. Merrill, veteran of World War II who is in business at Hillsboro and operates a filbert orchard near Aloha, is Democratic candidate for county commissioner.

T. M. Williams, business man and farmer, has lived in Washington county for six years, is married and has a family. He represents the party in the race for county sheriff. Williams declares he is strongly opposed to one-party rule and cites this belief as the reason for his last minute filing, last spring.

For the position of Justice of the Peace, in the Beaverton Justice district, Harold W. Johnston, 53, runs as a Democrat. He is married and has lived at West Slope for the past 6 years. A graduate of the University of Minnesota law college, he is now an automobile insurance adjuster.

HILLSBORO SHOWS CHAMPIONSHIP CALIBER IN RAMPAGING THRU '48 FOOTBALL SEASON

Into the Beaverton backyard on Friday, October 29, will come the Hillsboro high school football eleven to what promises to be a hard fought game, with Beaverton the underdogs hoping for an upset of the TYV league leaders. Unscored on this season in TYV league play, the Hillsboro Spartans have shown championship caliber by the enthusiasm with which they rampage through the 1948 football season. While first attention is centered on winning TYV laurels, the county seat gridgers also have their eyes on the possibility of a repeat play-off for state championship, as they earned in 1947.

REGISTRATION FOR NOV. 2 SHOWS GOP LISTING OF 16,347

By the number of candidates entered in political races and by the 1948 registration of voters, subject to the general election of November 2, the Republican party clearly dominates the county field over all parties. Total eligible electors for Washington county is 29,741, of which the Republicans have 16,347.

Democrats are listed by strength of 13,057, independents, 169, and other categories 168.

In the political field, Republicans are running for every office open. Paul Patterson, incumbent state senator, seeks re-election, based upon his record of service.

J. O. Johnson, aggressive young legislator who has represented the county during one special and three regular sessions, seeks re-election to continue the work that he has started. Prominent businessman in Tigard and vitally interested in the forward development of the county, he has a background of law and community service.

His activities in the legislature included important legislative committee work.

Earl E. Fisher, who has had 8 years experience in the state senate and 4 years as representative, is a resident of Beaverton. His legislative record shows that he is a staunch fighter for what he thinks is right and he is called one of the most incorruptible men in public service. He seeks election to the position on the GOP ticket.

For three county offices, only Republicans are listed: G. Russell Morgan for district attorney, Washington county; W. A. Tupper for county clerk; J. E. Carpenter, for county assessor.

James Lewis, incumbent county commissioner, is rounding out his 16th year and going full speed ahead in a bid for his fifth 4 year term, Republican.

R. H. Busch, who has been acting as sheriff since the death of John Connell, last spring, is the Republican candidate for election to the position. He bases his right to the job on fifteen years' experience in law enforcement.

Thurlock Weed, Beaverton attorney and resident of the county since 1910, seeks the position of justice of the peace, Beaverton Justice district, on the Republican ticket. Well-known in the county, he is at present secretary of the county selective service board and served 3 years duty in the armed forces during the recent war.

He has been a member of the Oregon bar since 1934, having earned his bachelor of law degree from Northwestern college of law. Prior to his wartime service, he served as a member of the Oregon state board of education, 1939-42.

Measures on State Ballot Touch Wide Interest Field

PENSIONS, BONUS, TAXATION, REFORESTATION FISHERIES, LIQUOR, VOTE RIGHTS INCLUDED

Affecting a wide field of interest, eleven items will be included on the November 2 ballot, of statewide interest. These measures include old age pensions, taxation, reforestation, hydro-electric law, the right to vote on school bonds, return to previous personal income tax exemptions, liquor by the drink, the Timber boy's camp, bonus for Oregon World War II veterans and a deficiency tax levy.

For quick reference, a brief summary of the 11 measures is published:

Six percent tax limitation amendment, 300—Yes, 301—No: To avoid voting on special tax levies for cities, counties and districts, where cost of government surpasses slowly increasing tax base, people may vote to establish new high base which shall be the average of total taxes levied (regular and special levies) for three successive years. This would guarantee a permanent tax base in line with an abnormal price condition.

Bonds for Reforestation, 302—Yes, 303—No: State bonds, under this proposal, to be sold in order to rehabilitate, acquire, plant and protect forests as well as to place forests on a permanent productive basis. Such outlays would be payable, first, from forest product revenue and, second, from general taxes.

Boys Camp near Timber, 304—Yes, 305—No: Proposes to set up a state juvenile camp at old CCC camp near Timber, in Washington county, for rehabilitation of delinquent boys, wards of state courts, between ages 12 to 18. Opponents contend that the facilities are not adequate nor properly located for constructive character building.

Hydro-electric projects, 306—Yes, 307—No: Outgrowth of action in 1947 legislature which "eased" the 1931 law for granting licenses to develop hydro power on Oregon rivers (in particular the Snake river in eastern Oregon). Public ownership groups contend this measure would impair important state rights and that the private Ox Bow development would block a larger, more comprehensive federal project which would bring wide benefits beyond increased kilowatts. Private power interests ask for its approval by its right to private enterprise.

Amendment of right to vote on school bonds, 308—Yes, 309—No: Since taxation procedures have progressed, and state income tax payment specifically contributes to school financing, this measure would give otherwise qualified voters a voice in the matter of school tax issues.

Old age pensions, 310—Yes, 311—No: To provide for and pay each needy woman of 60 years and needy man of 65 years a minimum old age pension of \$50 monthly, to feed, clothe, house and provide hospital, medical, dental and other needed care as well as decent burials. This is the fourth time a pension measure has been before the people.

Personal income tax exemptions, 312—Yes, 313—No: Returns such exemptions under state income tax back where they were prior to defeat of the sales tax, 1947. Before the 1947 legislature passed the "contingent measure" to take effect if the sales tax was voted down (as it was), exemptions were \$750 for single persons, \$1500 for married.

Highway Commission Sets Speedway For Canyon Road

ENGINEERS INDICATE STATE PLANS CURBS FOR FULL DISTANCE OF WIDENED ROADWAY

A speedway of the future which will totally disregard speed limits, such as the 25 mile zone within the city limits of Beaverton, is indicated by statements of engineers who met at the Beaverton city hall, Monday morning, October 24, with property owners along Canyon Road who protest blueprints calling for fifteen inch curbs in front of business places within the city.

Opening Attracts Crowds to New Furniture Store

According to Lloyd W. Selfridge, manager, the grand opening, this week, of the Beaverton Furniture store under new management has attracted really satisfactory crowds. Monday, the first day, was the best so far but people are coming in goodly numbers other days as well. Store hours are until 9 p.m.

Selection of winners for a list of free prizes and gifts, as announced last week, will be made at 4 p.m. on Saturday afternoon. All who have entered the contest are encouraged to be present, in order that a picture may be made of the winners.

These gifts are a "get-acquainted" gesture in honor of the open house week. Included in the list are a Montag President deluxe model electric range with automatic oven control, a Philco radio-phonograph cabinet, automatic electric iron, card table, wool blankets and many other items.

Between 30 and 40 were present at the meeting, who represent about 90% of property owners. Failing to come to any satisfactory understanding with the engineers, these property owners announce that they will circulate a petition and go directly to the heads of the state highway commission with their protests.

The dispute between property owners and the highway commission stems from the set of blueprints prepared for the widening of Canyon Road, particularly the section from Roy Kendall Motors to the West "Y", at Cedar Street.

On these plans, provision is made for an 18 inch curb, with a series of 25 foot entrances into business places. According to a study of blueprints, the openings provided will not serve highway business firms adequately, the property owners declare. Business from highway trade, unable to conveniently enter driveways or park, off the highway, will shrink alarmingly, the protest group fears.

Leaders in the attempt to stop curbing within the city limits of Beaverton are Elmer Stipe, of Speedy Freeze Market, Henry H. Jeffries, realtor, and others.

Highway engineers, at the Beaverton meeting, prophesied a curbing project from Portland to the West "Y", to include West Slope and Haskell Shopping Center. Provisions for such a contingency have been made at Haskell Center but different arrangements for parking will be required in West Slope, with the extension of the road toward business firms on the north side of the highway.

Beaverton business men are circulating a petition, which they promise to take to heads of the highway commission, seeking relief from a situation which, they fear, will seriously jeopardize the conduct of their businesses and endanger their livelihood.
