**Dec. 1 Deadline Urges Evidence Of Disablement**

Ex-servicemen or their survivors who must submit evidence of birth, marriage, divorce or death, to obtain veterans' benefits should seek help from authorized veterans' representatives, who can obtain vital statistics in this state without cost, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs advised today.

This reminder, the state veterans' agency said, is especially important now to veterans 60 percent or more disabled, who have until December 1 to submit certain vital statistics to the Veterans' Administration to secure retroactive compensation benefits under recently enacted Public Law 877.

This act provides additional compensation for seriously disabled veterans with dependents, if their disabilities are service-connected. Proof of dependency must be in the VA's files by December 1 to make these benefits payable back to September 1, effective date of the act.

Agencies who can help veterans obtain such records through county courts and the state board of health include county veterans' service officers, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Disabled American Veterans, the Red Cross, and VA contact officers. The same service is offered by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library Building, Salem, and 416 S. W. 11th Avenue, Portland.

A 1943 Oregon state law says these records will be made available free of charge to authorized agencies when such documents are necessary in processing veterans' claims for benefits. Some states charge for this service.

The vital statistics section of the state board of health, in Portland, reports that 5,624 free verifications of births, deaths, marriages, and divorces have been issued in 1948, including more
