With a ten lesson course, one hour each, in drivers' training to begin on Saturday morning, October 30, adult education classes for the winter get off to a flying start, in the Beaverton high school.

The driver classes will be open to women who register and qualify at the high school office before October 29, 4 p.m. Four adults will be taught in each group, with classes set for 9 a.m., 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m., 2 p.m., and 3 p.m. Competent instructors will be on hand and a dual control car, furnished through courtesy of Carr Chevrolet.

Other classes, subject to amount of interest shown by prospective students, will be in typewriting, shorthand, shop, woodworking, upholstery and ceramic arts. Those interested in any of these subjects are asked to call the high school office for further information. Classes will be held on Monday evenings.

A class of tailoring, under direction of Mrs. Charlotte Catts, Portland, will convene Monday evening Nov. 1, 7:30 p.m. under sponsorship of the division of vocational education for adults.

A small fee is charged for all of the courses. The ceramic arts class will be under the auspices of the University of Oregon Extension service and university credit may be obtained from it.

Oldtimer Home Run King Visits Site of Triumph

Henry Aiken, one of Beaverton's famous base ball players in earlier days was in town recently shaking hands with Doy Gray, W. E. Pegg, George Thynge, Earl Fisher and many others.

Beaverton fans will remember Henry Aiken as our famous first baseman of Beaverton Beavers penant winner champions of the Silver Cup 1914 Archer-Wiggins League composing some of the best semi-pro teams of Portland and the Tualatin valley.

Aiken will be remembered for "scooping 'em out of the dirt," "spearing 'em out from the air with one hand" and a terror with the willow! No man ever knocked so many home-runs during his many seasons of base ball in Beaverton as Henry Aiken!

Oldtimers will remember one July 4 celebration at Beaverton. The Gold Seals of Portland were playing the local Beavers for a \$25 prize. Martin Alberts was pitching a great game for Portland with his Gold Seals ahead—about the 7th inning Aiken came to bat for the Beavers and slammed a homer over the Warehouse (now Finley Mills) but still the Beavers were behind a couple runs. Then in the 9th inning with the bases full—Henry Aiken won lasting glory by knocking a homer that soared over the cupola on top of the warehouse, landed in Hedges yard and rolled over on Broadway—600 feet away, broke up the ball game and brot home the bacon for the Beavers.

For the past 21 years Mr. Aiken has been a member of the Klamath Falls Fire Department.

New City Truck Loses Tire, Cab Wednesday Fire

Recently purchased city road oil truck suffered the loss of one tire and damage to the cab in a spectacular blaze near the intersection of Hall and Farmington road, Wednesday morning. Fire Chief Archie Olson reports the blaze was of about five minutes duration.

HUNTERS BIVOUAC AS ELK SEASON STARTS

Both the Western and Eastern Oregon elk seasons opened Monday, October 25. The season in Western Oregon extends through November 2, while in the area east of the Dalles-California highway the season will continue through November 11.

The season in Western Oregon is restricted to the shooting of bulls with three points or better, while a large portion of Eastern Oregon will be open to the shooting of elk of either sex. The northeastern portion of the state will be open for the shooting of bull elk with visible horns only.

The Game Commission warns that hunters should consult the Oregon Hunter's Guide carefully for the exact boundaries of the various areas.

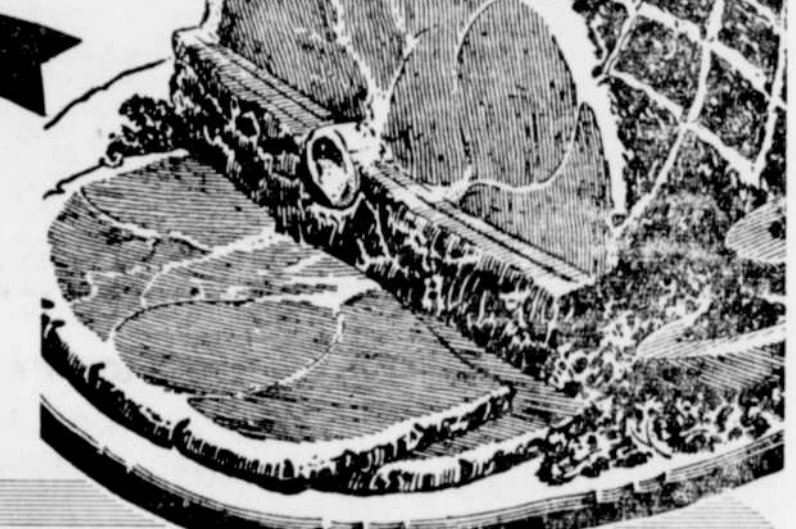
