Lewis and Clark College will be host to the annual one-day conference of the Willamette Valley Forensic Institute, sponsored by the Intercollegiate Forensic Association of Oregon on Saturday, November 6.

The conference is open to all high schools and colleges of the state and is expected to draw 300 students and coaches to the campus, according to Miss Adena Joy, director of forensics at Lewis and Clark. Among delegates invited will be students from Beaverton and Tigard high schools.

Two full programs have been planned, one for students and one for directors. Students will have the day for practice speaking in both extemporaneous and debate and for round-table discussions of their problems. Scheduled for directors will be talks on the topics of "Improving forensic contests" and "breaking into radio".

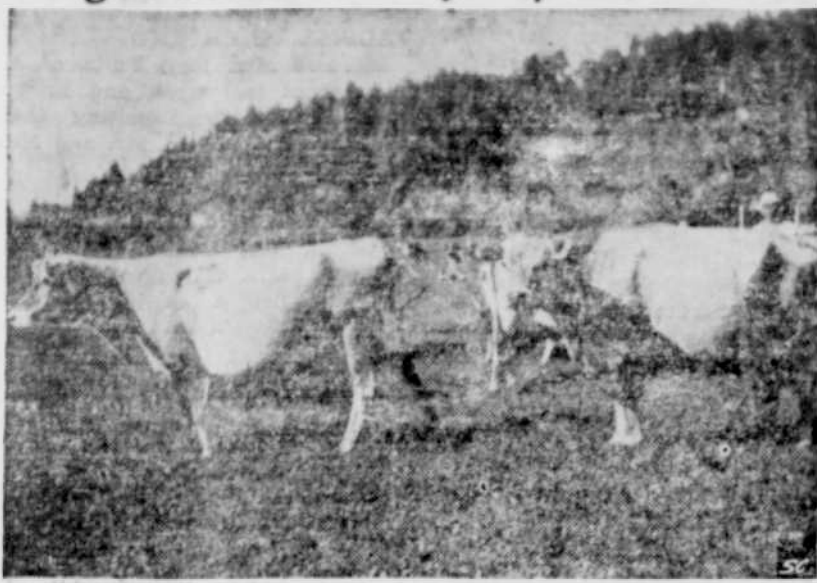

Oregon Youth Breaks Jersey Herd Record



LANGLOIS, OREGON—Ralph E. Cope, Jr., twenty-two year old Jersey breeder and the fourth generation of his family to operate the same farm, has early reached an enviable pinnacle of agricultural accomplishment. Ralph's herd of 32 registered Jerseys has recently completed its fourth year of production testing under the Herd Improvement Registry program of The American Jersey Cattle Club, and has established a new high average for the breed. The Gold Star award was presented to Ralph by The American Jersey Cattle Club for this record-breaking average of 628 pounds butterfat per cow maintained over the four-year period. The four separate years which contributed to this four-year total saw Ralph's herd compile yearly averages of 575, 627, 666 and 644 pounds butterfat per cow, eloquent testimonial to the high production which can be obtained from dairy cattle by selective breeding and good management. Ralph Cope, at the age of twenty-two years, has set an example which, if followed by more dairymen, would lead to a greater abundance of milk for America's people, and a better living for America's farmers.

Vet Adm. Eases Rule on Flight School Medical

secure the medical certificate from the veteran when he actually enrolls in a flying course.

Previously, veterans were required to forward a medical certificate or a certified or photostatic copy along with their original letter of justification to the VA.

Public Law 862, which limits veteran enrollments in recreational or avocational courses, requires veterans to submit a letter to the VA stating the reasons for wanting to take flying and establishing that flying will be used in their business.
