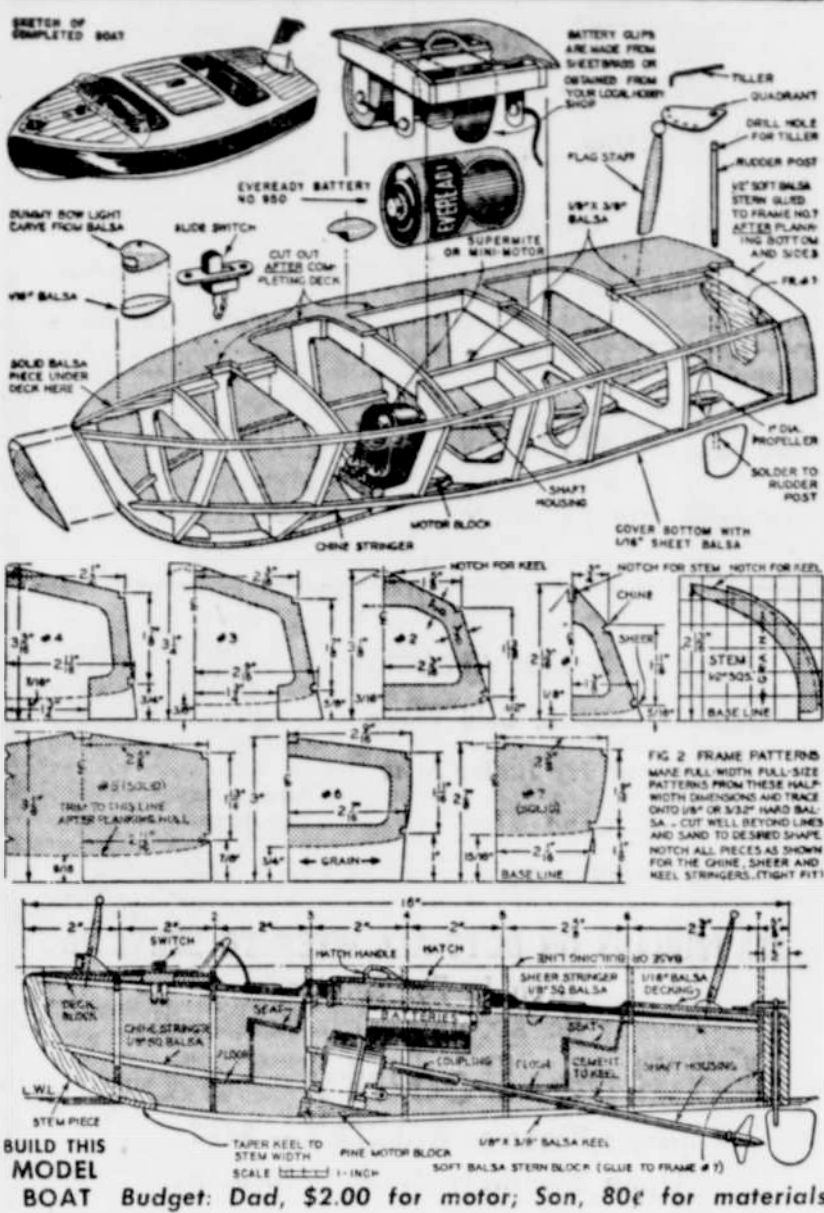


FATHER and SON



Dear Dad:
This 16-inch model speedboat not only is easy to build but will go faster than you can walk. Powered with two 10c Eveready No. 950 flashlight batteries which drive a miniature electric motor, this model will be at home in either your local pond or your bathtub.

You can build this boat from these plans and instructions and you can obtain additional construction details from the November issue of *Mechanix Illustrated* magazine, which will soon be available on your newsstand. Before starting the actual construction, visit your local hobby shop and obtain the necessary balsa wood and other supplies. For a workboard you'll need a smooth piece of wood (white pine or plywood) about 20" x 6" wide. Space out the position of the frames on this workboard as shown in Fig. 1 and then proceed to enlarge the frame outlines to full size on a sheet of 1/4" balsa. Carefully cut out each frame and set aside. The hull is built upside down on the board so pin each frame to your

workboard and then cement the 1/4" sq. stringers in place.

Bevel the stringers so they are even with the frames and then cover the bottom with 1/16" sheet balsa. When the cement is dry, trim the wood and cover the sides in the same manner. After an hour or so remove the structure from your workboard and cut the frames for the deck curve. Consult your plans and install the motor and prop shaft. Apply cement to all the inside joints and then cover the deck with 1/16" sheet. After the cement has dried, trim the edges, add the stem and stern blocks and cut out between Frames No. 3 and 5 for the hatch which holds the two Eveready No. 950 batteries.

Apply three coats of model airplane dope inside and out and you'll be ready for launching. If your model rides with the stern low, add lead to the stern to bring the water at the position shown in the plans.
