Moose Hunters Take Long Trip Have Good Luck

Three of five Beaverton and Scholls moose hunters returned on October 21 from an eight day moose-hunting expedition into the Canadian wilds out of Clinton, B. C. with three mammoth trophies destined for the frozen food lockers.

The party included successful hunters Joe Jackson, Henry Chapman and Oliver Taylor. Still wandering around the muskeg country at the time of their leave taking were Red Gillinwater and Jesse Snyder, who elected to stay over until they, too, could bag one of the mountainous animals.

Jackson's moose, which he got with a shot through the head, boasted a spread of "shovels" 36 inches in width. Chapman and Taylor brought back spreads of 46 inches and 48 inches. Weight of the animals averaged between 600 and 700 pounds each.

The party left Beaverton on October 13 and proceeded by car and pickup to Clinton, in the Fraser River and Caribou highway country. They followed an old wagon road for some 100 miles, back into the muskeg country where the ponderous moose runs wild. All the kills were made with 300 caliber Savage rifles.

Moose were not plentiful to the degree of blocking the road or tramping the spongy country side. Joe Jackson reports that he only saw five during the time of his hunting. Natives in the area estimate as many as 40,000 people, this year, have come to these moose-hunting grounds, with cars from practically every state in the union.

Not counting the expense of making a 1246 mile round trip, the hunters each paid \$25 to the Canadian government for a non-resident hunting license. Indian guide costs \$10 per day and he does not furnish camping facilities which hunters must arrange along with food and supplies. A trophy fee of \$60 must also be paid before crossing the Canadian line.

The hunters tell of seeing bear and mountain sheep on their trip but no caribou, which normally inhabit the higher plains to the northwest.

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Norblad Reports State of World At Kiwanis Meet

An all-time record of 84 members and guests attended the October 20 dinner meeting of the Beaverton Kiwanis Club in the local Kiwanis hall. The pot-luck supper was furnished by the Ladies of Kiwanis. Oscar Haag introduced candidates for office who were present as members or as guests.

Speaker of the evening was Walter Norblad, Congressman from the First Oregon District, who talked on world conditions as he had observed it during a recent world wide Congressional tour as a member of the Military Affairs Committee.

It is the Congressman's opinion that Russia is in no position to wage a war at the present time. Russia adopted the "scorched earth" policy when forced to retreat during the German invasion, and the Germans adopted the same policy when they were driven back out of Russia. Consequently, a large part of European Russia was utterly destroyed and it will take many years to re-develop the industries so essential to maintain a full-scale war. The only danger, as Mr. Norblad sees it, is that some minor incident may touch off the torch of war just as such an incident was responsible for launching World War I.

Norblad stated that the present Berlin situation is due principally to the oversight at Potsdam Conference of the Western Powers to make an express provision for a corridor or corridors through the western Russian zone of occupation to Berlin. Such a corridor, of course, was implied in the agreement, in order that the zones in Berlin allotted to the Western Powers could be supplied properly with needed materials.

The situation in the Orient, according to the Congressman, has the possibility of developing into a most serious one. It is but a question of time before all China will be Communist dominated and encroachments made upon The Philippines, Southeastern Asia and the East Indies.

The economy of China today is tragic. Reliable sources estimate that eighty per cent of the relief goods sent to China end in Black Market and but twenty per cent reach the people for whom the aid is intended. Corruption is rampant, and there is no efficiency in any part of the Chinese government. Millions of dollars of machinery sent by this country to rehabilitate the country rusts and rots for lack of use. Most of Chiang Kai Shek's advisers and department heads are uneducated military men and do not have the experience or capacity to administer their duties properly.

Mr. Norblad closed his talk by urging continued aid program to the rest of the world despite the many drawbacks of such programs. He stated that the U. S. must send trained administrators overseas to supervise the actual distribution, for otherwise four-fifths of such aid is completely lost. Only by taking such a step can we be assured that our goods reach the hands of those for whom they are intended.

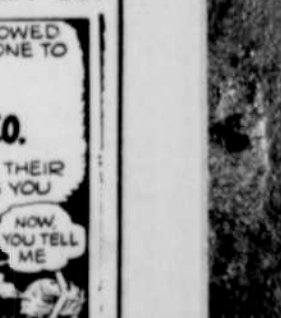
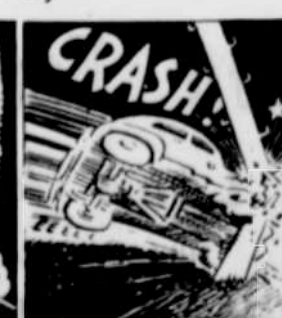
