LEGAL NOTICE BEAVERTON, OREGON Specifications For Equipment Sewage Treatment Plant And Sewage Pumping Stations NOTICE TO BIDDERS

Sealed proposals for furnishing equipment for a sewage treatment plant and three sewage pumping stations will be received by the City of Beaverton, Oregon until 7:30 P.M., December 6, 1948, and thereafter will be publicly opened and read. Proposals shall be addressed to the City of Beaverton and mailed or delivered to the City Recorder.

The equipment for which bids are invited will be used in a low rate trickling filter plant and three raw sewage pumping stations. Proposals may be made for furnishing any or all of the equipment specified, but no bid will be considered when submitted on an "all or none" basis. The City reserves the right to make separate awards to different suppliers if it is in the City's interest to do so.

If any bids submitted contain escalator clauses, the bidders shall indicate the maximum percentage or maximum cost under the escalator clause, and bids will be compared on a basis of maximum escalator prices if firm prices are not bid.

Payment for the equipment specified shall be made out of funds authorized by the voters of Beaverton on August 25, 1948.

Deadline for Tax Refund Vets' Next Of Kin Ends 1948

Next of kin of veterans who died in active service any time between December 7, 1941 and December 31, 1947, and who paid federal income tax for any year or part of a year they were in service, are eligible for a refund of those taxes, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs said today.

Public Law 367 of the 80th Congress in providing for tax abatement sets December 31 of this year as the deadline for filing claims for refunds on incomes prior to 1945. For 1945 and subsequent incomes, such claims may be filed any time within three years after the tax return was filed. This would make March 15, 1949 the deadline for claiming a refund on 1945 income taxes.

The Oregon veterans' agency said in some instances this act could result in considerable refunds to next of kin, where the deceased veteran had enlisted toward the close of any year after having earned a substantial income as a civilian during that year and paying taxes on the income.

The law covers federal income taxes paid by or for servicemen for tax years dating back to December 7, 1941, during any part of which they served in the armed forces.

Claim for refund and evidence of relationship to the deceased should be filed with the Bureau of Internal Revenue in the state where the veteran is assumed to have filed his tax return.

Assistance in filing claims will be given by bureau officials, who point out that next of kin should first write internal revenue offices in the state where the veteran normally would have filed his income tax returns to ascertain whether such taxes had been paid during the period covered by the law. However, they advise filing a claim where there is reason to believe a refund is due under the law.

The necessary forms and assistance are available at internal revenue offices in the following Oregon cities: Eugene, Salem, Klamath Falls, LaGrande, Baker, Pendleton, The Dalles, Bend, Medford, Roseburg, Coos Bay, Hillsboro, Astoria, Tillamook, Oregon City and in the Custom House and the Pittock Block, Portland.

Clothing Price Drop Not Likely Says Ext. Expert

If you've been holding off buying that new suit or dress just because you think clothing prices are due for a drop—well, an Oregon State college expert has nothing but a dim outlook for you.

Extension Clothing Specialist Miss Lucy Lane says most clothing will remain high during the coming winter. That is, barring sudden changes in the overall economic scene.

Take woolen clothing, for example. Miss Lane points out that wool prices are again moving upwards. This is just forewarning, she says, of continued high prices for wool garments in coming months.

On the other hand, Miss Lane sees some relief in sight for prices on such clothing items as men's shirts, pajamas, underwear—as well as women's hosiery. Meanwhile, the trade reports some let-up in the demand for men's overcoats. There was even some carry-over of overcoat stocks from last winter.

As to what's happening in the general clothing price scene, Miss Lane says clothing prices leveled off in the spring and late summer of 1947. They were off again last winter and climbed seven percent by March, 1948. Now again, a leveling off is taking place, especially in cotton and rayon goods. Except wool, that is.

Miss Lane says some clothing makers are resorting to what she calls "hidden price increases" to meet consumer resistance to rising prices. The way that's done is to reduce the amount of fabric, quality of construction and trimmings.

Despite all these tricks, Miss Lane says workmanship in clothing is better now than any time since 1941.
