Ced. Mill Woman Tells Thrills of Trip to Denmark

Returning last week from a trip to Denmark, Mrs. Marie Breitenstein reports a most enjoyable voyage.

After leaving here in the spring, she took sightseeing tours in Chicago, Washington, D. C., Mt. Vernon, Alexandria and New York.

She describes her trip to England on the Queen Mary as an exciting adventure. On reaching England she was taken on a tour of London before embarking on a smaller vessel to Denmark.

In Denmark she visited relatives including her sister and brother-in-law and toured the entire country, also spending one day in Sweden. She marvels at the satisfaction of the people there in comparison to here in the states.

They accept their rationing with grace knowing there is nothing better to be had. She could hardly believe their satisfaction at moving around by means of bicycles.

She especially remarked about the families with a couple of children going to and from market and people moving their worldly goods to new homes via bicycles.

Throngs of tourists are swarming the country in this post war era. Some 10,000 were there at the time of her visit.

She describes the gay festivities of the country as colorful and entrancing.

Indian Student Tells Troubles Of India Today

A picture life and problems in India was presented to the Forest Grove-Hillsboro chapter of AAUW by Holando Lyndah, a Christian Indian, at the dinner meeting of the group at the Forest Grove Christian church Wednesday, Nov. 10.

Mr. Lyndah, a graduate of the University of Calcutta, India, is working for his master's degree in education at Pacific university.

Among the difficulties confronting India today, Mr. Lyndah said, are the poverty of her people and their constant struggle for existence, illiteracy and the prevalence of diseases and lack of medical aid. Dysentery, cholera, malaria and other tropical diseases are common and there is an average of one nurse to 40,000 people.

"The life expectancy in India today is 22 years," Mr. Lyndah stated, and added that he was living on borrowed time.

Great extremes of climate prevail in different parts of India from one section with 400 inches of rainfall yearly, to a section in which there is less than one inch.

"All Indians, contrary to general belief in America, are not Hindus," Mr. Lyndah explained. The Hindu is a member of a religious sect. There are about 250 million Hindus in India and only about 10 million Christians.

Common Cold Still Defies Science

With about 94 per cent of the American population due to come down with at least one cold during the next twelve months, scientists throughout the country are continuing their fight against the nation's number one disease. At any one time in the winter, an average of 23,000,000 persons suffer from this unpleasant ailment. Experts estimate that colds cost the nation at least \$2 billion annually in medical expenses and lost pay.

What causes the common cold has puzzled humanity for over 2,000 years. During the course of history many theories have been advanced, including everything from "pestilential vapors" and the influence of comets to bed bugs and face powder.

About twenty years ago, it became generally agreed among the medical profession that colds were caused by viruses, invisible bits of matter which reach their victims through the air as well as by direct contact.

Then, late in 1947, the U. S. Public Health Service announced

that researchers at the National Institute of Health had succeeded in isolating a virus which is the cause of one type of common cold.

But the researchers themselves stated that their work pointed only "to the possibility, not the probability of producing a vaccine." Nevertheless, this first successful isolation of a cold-causing virus is a real ray of hope for the eventual solution of the problem.

Although no cure for colds has been found, there are ways to avoid them. Medical authorities offer these suggestions as the best insurance against colds:

Keep healthy by eating proper foods and getting enough fresh air and exercise and plenty of rest.

Avoid chilling by dressing properly—wear warm clothes in cold weather and wear overshoes, rubbers and protective covering when it rains or snows.

Whenever possible, stay strictly away from anyone who has a cold and keep out of drafts.

If you fall victim to the common cold, go to bed and rest, eat light meals, and drink plenty of water. Call a doctor if you have a fever, aches or a racking cough for more than 24 hours.

"Mike" Callahan Goes To Rescue Yanks In China

If some 4,600 American citizens in Tsingtao, China, only knew, they would instantly take heart.

Mike Callahan is on the way. Beleaguered by a civil war among the Chinese, which has suddenly flared to great proportions, these citizens will depend upon the United States Marine corps to get them safely out of the range of flying bullets and the uneasiness of being non-participating spectators in a highly explosive setting.

Writing from Oahu, Hawaii, Pfc. Mike Callahan, formerly of Beaverton, says that one week in the new climate has proved to be hot enough for him. But he expects his travels to show him much hotter places before he again trods the soil of the United States.

"As yet, none of us know exactly where we're going," Mike writes. "One thing we do know, however, and that's that we've been sent out here for one purpose, to get the 4,600 Americans out of Tsingtao, China. As soon as this has been accomplished, we'll return to the states and civilization once again."

"There was a time, once, when I liked being in a transport squadron. But lately, I don't exactly know what I like."

Mike is very enthusiastic in his appreciation of the BEAVERTON ENTERPRISE, the first copy of which reached him, in Oahu, with in a week of his arrival there. He estimates his tour of duty overseas at from six weeks to three months, but he isn't even thinking of getting home on leave until February or March.

Slugs Slug Crops Sluggers Get Tip How to Slug 'em

Slug damage in vetch and Austrian pea fields has been showing up in scattered areas in Washington county reports Palmer Torvond, county agent.

Where growers are uncertain as to whether or not damage is occurring, check baits should be put out in various fields and examined in the following two or three days to see whether or not slugs are present.

If slugs appear at the check baits, it is recommended that the area or field be treated.

Some growers are reporting that slugs are causing damage in certain areas of the field. Where this is true, it may be possible to get good control with bait applied to just the affected area.

However, if a farmer is not certain as to the extent of the infestation, it is recommended that the entire field be baited.

Commercially prepared baits in either the pellet or bran form are recommended.

Oregon's Ex-GI's Borrow Heavily in September

Oregon's ex-servicemen of World War II borrowed more money under the state veterans' loan act to purchase farms and homes in September than in any other month in the three-year history of the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, Director William F. Gaarenstroom announced today.

Last month 218 veterans borrowed \$939,470 to buy, build or refinance dwellings under the increasingly popular four-percent, \$6000 maximum state loan available to men and women who were Oregon residents before entering the armed forces in World War II.

This was 17 loans and \$78,520 more than in August, the previous high and brings the three year total to 2200 loans approved for a sum of \$8,181,589.

More than five and one-half millions, or 70 percent, of this amount was loaned in the nine months of 1948 alone. Loans per month for 1948 averaged \$638,374, while the average for the past 4 months starting in June was \$947,105.

Statistics from the state veterans' agency show that 43 percent of the applications for loans since January 1 originated in the Portland office, serving Multnomah and surrounding counties. The remaining 57 per cent are from all other counties, where veterans apply either through their county service officers or by writing the department in the State Library Building, Salem.
