Gordon Faber—This Spartan end was unquestionably the toughest defensive end in the league and also could hold up his end of pass-catching duties. His territory was strictly off limits to enemy backs all season.

Emil Brandaw—This 215 pound husky showed vast improvement to nail down a tackle slot on the stellar eleven. Brandaw's forte

was defense, with very little yardage made over his spot during the season. He was a bulwark of the toughest line in the league.

Paul Bell—A standout on a good Beaver ball club. Tough on defense, Bell also had much to do with opening the holes through which Bob Zahler and Bud Cox romped for considerable yardage.

Les Hershey—Enough said. A unanimous choice and he should have been. He was all over the field on defense. When Hillsboro's line tossed some business his way, he saw that it was disposed of in the inimitable Hershey fashion.

Jim Watson—A 211 pound senior, Watson wreaked havoc from his tackle spot during the season. His line work was a big factor in Tigard's 6-0 upset over Hillsboro.

Irvin Hanville—A terrific tackle who stopped practically everything directed at his side of the line. Alert and fast, Hanville's specialty was blocking kicks and running them back for touchdowns.

Don Hoy—This six-vote favorite used his basketball training to good advantage in grabbing passes for Newberg's Tigers. He was a master at feinting defensive backs out of position and then grabbing tosses from Quarterback Ted Rosen. Not just a pass-grabbing specialist, Hoy could also do a job defensively.

Dick Voll—The Spartan signal-caller proved his versatility by doing the Spartan passing, punting, place-kicking and occasionally piling up considerable yardage on foot. The best punter in the league, Voll didn't get off a bad one all year. He also was a strong-sure linebacker.

Vernon LeRoy—He was half the Grizzly one-two punch, as aided and abetted by Sammy Johnson. A 185-pounder, LeRoy's runs were hard to stop. He called the Grizzly signals.
