Third class mailing service requires handling one time only. In the case of a changed address, there is no such thing as forwarding a letter. It is unceremoniously dumped into the "Dead Letter" file.

Where the address is incorrect, third class handling will not permit return to sender. Again, the dead letter department is increased. All who feel impelled to use the third class mailing privilege are, of course, fully entitled to do so. But cards which contain a personal greeting, other than mere signature, cannot come under this class

When there is any doubt of an address or when you are not sure that addresses have not been changed, the safest rule-to assure delivery-is to use first class mail. It is an insurance for the actual receipt of a Christmas sentiment.
