Lacking Proof of Status Holds Up Death Benefits

Some death benefits due the widows and other dependents of deceased veterans are being delayed because of lack of proof of change in the veteran's family status, the veterans administration warns.

A particular factor causing delay in payment of benefits to widows of some veterans is lack of proof of dissolution of previous marriages by death, divorce or annulment.

To help prevent unnecessary delay in death settlements, the VA suggests that veterans keep available in a safe, convenient and fire-proof location such documents or affidavits as discharge papers, marriage, divorce and birth records, wills and other vital family papers.

Veterans who have claimed VA benefits and have been assigned claims "C" numbers may also find it advisable to have extra copies of these documents placed in their VA claims folders. If needed in connection with VA benefits, they would then be available immediately. All such documents turned over to the VA should bear the veteran's "C" number for easy identification.

THAT PICKS 'EM OFF

JUST DON'T LIKE IT

The game commission, by many methods of justification and explanation, is coming around to a simple announcement that fishing licenses must be increased in order to maintain a five-year program of hunting and fishing. The pitch is that present income of some 1 1/2 million dollars must be raised to \$3 million and this will be translated to the ordinary fisher in terms of a boost from \$3 to \$7 per season in license fees.

There may be plenty of reasoning behind the game commission's proposal but the stark fact is that many casual outdoorsmen just don't like the idea. They feel, with some undeniable justification, that such a high price for the privilege of fishing will make it impossible for them to take occasional advantage of the streams and lakes for a day of outdoors recreation.

A tendency in many lines, during this postwar period of high employment and even higher prices, has been constantly upward. The game commission finds this case in its work, with even fish food swelling in price from 1 1/4 or 2 cents a pound to 12 or 13 cents.

The game department's present policy of license fees is today the same as in 1931, 1932 and 1933 when the country was in the grip of its worst depression. In the last ten years, fishing and hunting has attracted a record 163% participation, based on the early figure, further aggravating the picture.

Why the commission feels an increase is more justified on the general license level might well be an indication that its plans for the future are of the colossal sort. For a license fee more than 230% of the old, indeed, great things might well be anticipated.

Of course, there are some sportsmen who look with jaundiced eye at some of the much-publicized projects of the game commission. Maybe a clerk somewhere reads of the stocking of faraway lakes and streams and feels less interested by far because his fishing is more or less confined to one-day jaunts reasonably close to home.

So, it is with vigorous hope that such a fishing fan regards the prophesied increase of license rate.

Perhaps with a 230% income, the game commission will be able to spread its program farther and bring about even more benefits to the average, occasional outdoors fan.

Three Research Labs Will Aid Polio Diagnosis

Formal opening of a modernized virus research section at the University of Oregon medical school was announced this week in a communication signed by Dr. Arthur W. Frisch, director of the institution's research program.

The section's modernization program, started two years ago, has given the medical school three up-to-date virus research laboratories, according to Dr. Frisch who said the entire cost \$13,000 had been stooed by the Multnomah and Josephine county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"We are now setting up procedures whereby doctors in all parts of Oregon can send in samples of blood suspected of containing viruses, and we will seek to make positive identification," Dr. Frisch explained.

This type of work has been carried on at the medical school on a limited basis for some time but Dr. Frisch pointed out that availability of the three laboratories "will result in immediate acceleration of the entire virus research program."

Dr. Frisch and his staff of three graduate students and a graduate technician intend to devote their principal research to mouse-type polio and "Q" fever, with secondary emphasis being placed on such other viruses as those responsible for influenza and mumps.

Prime implements in their laboratory operations are two centrifuges for separating serums—centrifuges which were purchased with a grant from the Josephine county chapter of the National Foundation.
