Personal information about both students is sent with the essay and test to Washington, D. C. to be judged against others from all over the nation.

The 40 highest students according to essay and test will be given a free trip in the spring to the Science Talent Institute in Washington, D. C. to compete for Westinghouse scholarships, top ones of which will be \$2,800 and \$2,000.

"There were other students just as good in science as John and Stanley, but they failed to write their essays. Without the essay the test couldn't be taken," said Mrs. Ward.

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Resolution Cites
Referendum Law
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RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: The Initiative and Referendum Amendment to the Oregon Constitution was overwhelmingly adopted by a vote of the people on June 2nd, 1902, after a vigorous campaign spearheaded by leading farm organizations for the purpose of safeguarding the rights and promoting the best interests of the rank and file of the people; and WHEREAS:

There are at the present time organizations and individuals in places of influence who are either advocating its repeal or amending it in such a manner that its effectiveness and rightful purpose will be violated: Therefore be it resolved:

By the Laurel-Schools Farmers Union Local this 9th day of December, 1948, that we resist all efforts to repeal or decrease the effectiveness of the initiative and referendum amendment to our constitution: and be it further resolved:

That a copy of this Resolution be sent for action to the County Farmers Union and to the State Convention to be held in 1949, and to the press.

Unanimously adopted December 9, 1948.

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Nov. Payments to
Jobless Shrink;
Claims Balloon

November payments to Oregon's unemployed workers were lower than in 1947, but an influx of new claims in the past two weeks threatens to push benefits above the previous benefit year, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reports.

Civilians received \$535,365 last month, only 1.6 per cent higher than in November, 1947, while unemployed veterans were paid \$229,567, a decrease of 28.1 per cent. The total of \$764,932 compares with \$846,826 in November a year ago.

The seasonal increase in payments for the past month as compared with October was slightly higher than a year ago, \$252,700 to \$220,050, and an even greater upward trend is expected for December. Payments in December, 1947, were nearly 56 per cent greater than in the previous month.

New Oregon claims filed in local offices last month nearly doubled October's total of 5,176, reaching 10,085, a November record. Shutdown of many lumber and logging plants, added to the usual seasonal slackening in construction brought the number of claims in 9, 1948.

the 1948-49 benefit year to 45,809 as compared to 41,214 a year ago.

Lumbering, retail trade, financial and service groups showed the biggest increases in employees receiving benefits as compared with 1947. Lumber's share of the beneficiaries increased from 14.3 to 20 per cent, retailers from 7 to 10.3 per cent and the financial and service workers from 7.2 to 11.5 per cent.

Principal areas with upward trends in claims were Coos Bay and Astoria, both more than doubling last year's totals. Portland, Oregon City, Albany and Salem all sent out fewer checks than in 1947, but the capital city local office, serving Marion and Polk counties, reported 1,230 new claims, nearly double last year's figure.
