**Pegg Entertains Open House on Thurs., Dec. 30th**  
The public, on Thursday, December 30, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. were guests at an open house at Pegg's Mortuary at their newly completed building on Second and Watson streets, in Beaverton. A program of organ and vocal music was presented and punch and cookies served.  
Construction on the new funeral home began in the middle of April, with Erick Otness, Portland, awarded the general contract. Architect was Donald Edmondson.  
Sub contractors, for work or material included: E. and W. Sewing Clinic, Beaverton Hardware, United Builders, Beaver Plumbing Co., L. H. Cobb, Bilstad Linoleum, Wally's Electric and J. and G. Concrete Products, all of Beaverton; MacCormack Tile company of Hillsboro and Oregon Music, Baker-Barton company, Columbia Cabinet and Fixtures Corp., Acme Metal Works and Fuller Paint and Glass company, all of Portland.  
An imposing structure, the new funeral home has been described as one of the most modern and beautiful in the state of Oregon. Of concrete block construction, it measures about 90 feet by 80 feet, at its widest dimensions.  
Rooms include a chapel of vaulted ceiling with large Rose Art glass window set in white picture-type frame and seating 153. Walls are rose tinted and floors of inlaid cork. New blonde oak pews and pulpit have been installed. Lights have been especially designed, with ball sphere fixtures.  
Auxiliary rooms to the chapel will give added seating capacity when needed. In the music room, a new Baldwin electric organ, recognized as one of the finest available, has been added.  
Other features of the new building are the office, slumber room, casket display room, preparation room, large garage and storage and boiler room for heating equipment. On the second floor are two apartments, one of 2 bedrooms and the other of 3 bedrooms.  
Mr. Pegg established the funeral firm in 1910 and operated it continuously until April 1 of this year. At that time, William V. Spears, who had been associated for 11 years with Pearson's Funeral Church of Portland, joined the company as a co-partner.  
For the grand opening day, local musicians and friends from neighboring towns came in to play the organ and sing.
