

Beaverton Head March of Dimes Plans Campaign

Mrs. Donald L. Jenkins, 165 S. E. Washington, named local chairman for the 1949 March of Dimes campaign at Beaverton, reports she is planning a community-wide appeal for the raising of funds for the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation.

Under direction of guardians, local Camp Fire girls will conduct house-to-house distribution of pledge cards. Containers for March of Dimes contributions will be placed in all business houses. Footprints will be painted on city sidewalks to remind people of the great need of funds for the foundation, along with a banner to be hung across the street, emphasizing the campaign.

Plans for a benefit dance or other entertainment, to raise much needed money this year, are being considered, Mrs. Jenkins reports.

The official drive for funds to roll back the increasing threat of polio will begin on Friday, January 14, with Reid Cottrell, Hillsboro, again acting as county chairman.

In the state of Oregon, 1948 figures compiled by the United States public health service list 219 cases, as compared to 110 in 1947. National foundation funds, which listed \$6,000,000 in its epidemic aid fund at the start of 1948 and wound up \$520,000 "in the red," will need \$30 million to do its proper job.

Among the works he has written are "Native Woody Plants of the U. S.," "The American Land," "Ornamental American Shrubs" and he was co-author of "The Land Renewed, Wild Life of America."
