**Office Warns of
Soc. Sec. No. Use
In Identification**

Social security account number cards should not be accepted as identification for the purpose of cashing checks, according to James E. Peebles, manager of the Portland office of the Social Security Administration.

The Social Security Administration does not attempt to establish definitely the identity of an individual until such time as a claim is filed at age 65 or upon death of an insured individual, said Peebles.

Therefore, the merchant or other person who accepts the social security account number as identification for the purpose of cashing a check is on very shaky ground.

Furthermore, the records of the Social Security Administration are confidential and ordinarily are not available for verification to persons other than the wage earner himself.

These records are maintained solely for the purpose of keeping a record of the wages earned by individuals covered by the system.

Forage poisoning, common in horses and cattle, is caused by a spore-forming germ that thrives in soil and in old stacks of oat straw and hay.

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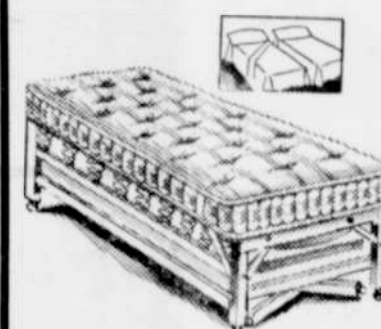
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
