The McKay Blue Birds held a social meeting on Thursday, January 6th. The youngsters played games and had refreshments.

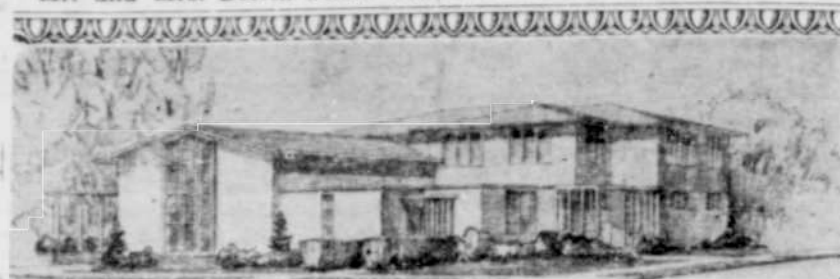
BROTHER'S GUESTS

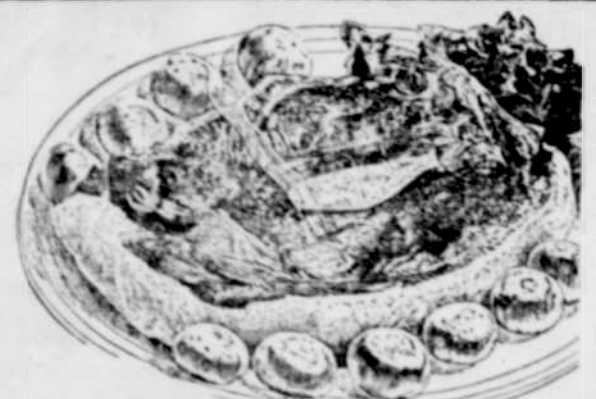
