Beaverton and Tigard Win TYV League Casaba Opener

BEAVERS TOP McMinnville HI 37 TO 31 WHILE
TIGARD TAKES W. LINN, OVERTIME GAME, 59-58

Beaverton and Tigard high schools made successful bows in the opening games of the TYV basketball season, Friday night, on a date that saw every team in the league in play.

In a fast, tight game in which they managed to stay in the lead from the first quarter on, the Beavers surged ahead of the McMinnville Grizzlies 3 to 31. Duane Rasmussen, lanky center at Beaverton, led his team mates in scoring, with 11 tallies. Three Grizzlies tied for top score among the losers, with 9 each, scored by Marvin Montgomery, Irvin Hanville and Dennis Atkinson.

Tigard's triumph followed a wild melee in which the regular game time ended in a 50 to 50 tie, after the winners had come from behind to whittle down a 13 point lead by West Linn, in the last quarter. The Tigers went

on, in an overtime session, to eke out a 59 to 58 win.

High point scorer for Tigard, with 21 was Toby Lewis while Bob Adrian, of the losers, collected the same number of points. At Hillsboro, Oregon City Pioneers upset Hilli 46 to 45 in a riotous encounter which was knotted at halftime at 18 all. Bob Frantz, of the losers, led game scoring with 23 points while Bruce Ruminaki, with 14 points, topped the losers.

In the other TYV encounter, Newberg invaded the dismal barn of Forest Grove's basketball court to meet defeat, in the least thrilling game of the league. Forest Grove, with 62 points, outlasted the highly rated Newberg quintet, which netted but 48 points.

In "B" team encounters, Beaverton's squad defeated MacHi 40 to 36; Hillsboro's "B" contingent nosed out Oregon City, 35 to 33 and Tigard's Bees downed West Linn 36 to 35.

CHAMP THINKS OVER SEASON IN SAWDUST

Dalley Brothers circus comes up with the novel idea of having the heavyweight champion travel with the circus, from April 16 to November 16, on a twice-a-day exhibition schedule. The circus pitch would probably follow the traditional routine of calling for opponents from the crowd, with an offer of so much for each round weathered.

Such an idea, on its surface, would seem to guarantee sell-out crowds for circus stands. Joe Lewis is one of the top drawing cards in the fight business.
