HILLSBORO SWAMPS HAPLESS BEAVERS 32 TO 25;
TIGERS TROMP FOREST GROVE IN FRIDAY GAMES

BEAVER BASKETBALL STORY

It was top of the heap for Tigard high school's basketball quintet, last Friday night, with a 44 to 38 tromping of Forest Grove at the Tigard gym. With this victory, the Tigers dominated TYV league standings, at least for a while, and their task now remains to stay where they have landed.

Art White, Forest Grove guard, led the scoring in the fracas, with 15 points for the losers, while Toby Lewis was high among his victorious team mates with 11 points.

Beaverton's scantily enjoyed 3-way tie for top league honors suffered severe jolts when Hillsboro high reached up from the cellar to smack the high-point eager-Beavers 32 to 25, at Beaverton.

Hillsboro showed flashes of the

power earlier expected of them and were somewhat aided and abetted by the apparent desire of the Beaverton players to end up in the high point scorer's spot. On the basis of teamwork the Beavers were noticeably lax, with guard, Chuck Hullings, easily the standout player of the night — even though he missed the high point honor.

Top scorer for the victors was Bob Frantz, 5 foot 11 forward, who swished through some 13 points. Duane Rasmussen, Beaverton's 6' 3" center, led his teammates with 10 points.
