MYF SOCIAL EVENT

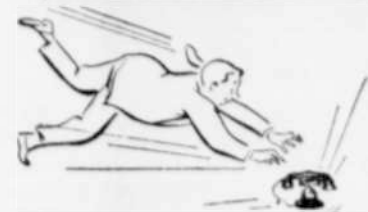
The M. Y. F. had an excellent social gathering at the church Saturday evening, January 15th, under the leadership of Miss Dixie Harrell.
