EVENTS AS CHRONICLED BY OUR CONTEMPORARIES
IN SURROUNDING NORTHWEST COMMUNITIES

APPEAL MADE PERSONAL

Throughout the state, judging what exchange copies have been looked at, various communities are making a determined effort to swell the funds collected in 1949's March of Dimes. Particularly newsworthy is the appeal at Gresham, which has taken on a personal aspect.

The OUTLOOK tells of a program, held in the Fairview grade school, which will include band music, singing, musical skits and a play on "Doris Cummings Day."

The honored young lady, for several years, has been an infantile paralysis victim. A 9-year old girl, she is an active school student, a member of the tumbling team and better than average in her scholastic marks.

The girl, herself, will not be able to attend the March of Dimes benefit, however, she has had to return to the Shriners hospital in Portland for another operation.

But during the long days ahead, she will be able to play a transcription of the special polio-fight programs. The entire show has been recorded and will bring some measure of cheer during Doris's 2 or 3 week's confinement in the hospital.

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CONDEMNATION SUIT

Highway improvement plans, at St. Helens, will go ahead as planned. But the price, judging result of a condemnation suit, will be in the amount of \$26,000.

Jury verdict, reports the SENTINEL MIST, awards the Jewel ice cream company there the above amount at the climax of a suit the company brought for \$100,000 damages.

The state association also went on record to petition the state fair to change dates for its exhibition to the last week in September, in order to give agricultural products a chance to reach top condition before exhibit.
