

THE DRUMS ARE BEATING

SALES TAX MANEUVERS

Can you hear the muted "tomb-tom"? It is faint and tentative. But the sound of the thumping come, from time to time.

Many a maneuver for a state sales tax, which has so ignominiously met defeat at the polls in the past, will not be recorded in the public prints. Likewise, many a stout denial can be obtained, with little trying.

Washington county representative, J. O. Johnson, says flatly, "there will be no general sales tax, even though the die-hards are still fighting."

However, he points out, an increase of the state gasoline tax and a new tobacco tax (for one reason or another) are definite possibilities. While they approximate a sales tax, these levies will not be so general as to tax the bread and butter of the minimum-wage bracket of taxpayers.

COUNTY DISTRICT COURT

Justice of the Peace court in Hillsboro would be the only one in Washington county that would be eliminated under provisions of a proposed law for establishment of a district court.

Need for the new judicial wing is explained as past due, because of the upward population climb.

It was with the expectation of such a district court that the Washington county court, previous to the last year's elections, suggested wiping out the Beaverton j.p. district.

MILK CONTROL HEARING

After adjournment of the lower house, Tuesday, February 15, dairymen interested in retaining Oregon's Milk Control law will have a chance to appear in opposition to two repeal bills.

H. B. 68 and S. B. 4, both repeal measures, will be subject of a public discussion in Room 321, State Capitol building.

Dairymen—including producers, processors and some distributors—are lined up on one side, favoring the milk law. Safeway Stores and a citizen's milk committee are main proponents for repeal of the law. The heat might prove intense.

A thought to be considered, in forecasting what might happen to the lacteal regimentation statute, is that many farmers, business men and lawyers from the "cow country" are numbered among legislators. It seems that they will offer stubborn resistance for any measures of outright repeal.

Washington county dairymen, it is believed, have recommended some amendments to the Milk Control law but will stubbornly fight off any idea of removing it from the statute books.

OUR GLORIFIED SPUD

The lowly Oregon potato is just about set for a dressing up. Maybe they will undergo a lustre-cream shampoo. But whatever the doling up, Mr. Jonathan Public will probably be nicked in excess of the 1½¢ tax that the lower house would impose on each hundred weight of potatoes—for glorifying the Oregon Spud.

Certainly the house of representatives do not lack in any individual singleness of outlook.

While the Federal government is paying parity prices for potatoes that are in excess of consumer needs, then returning them to farmers at practically nothing, for stock feed; while tons and tons of the basic food item rot and waste because man apparently cannot live on spuds alone, the lower house would get into the potato picture with their own rules.

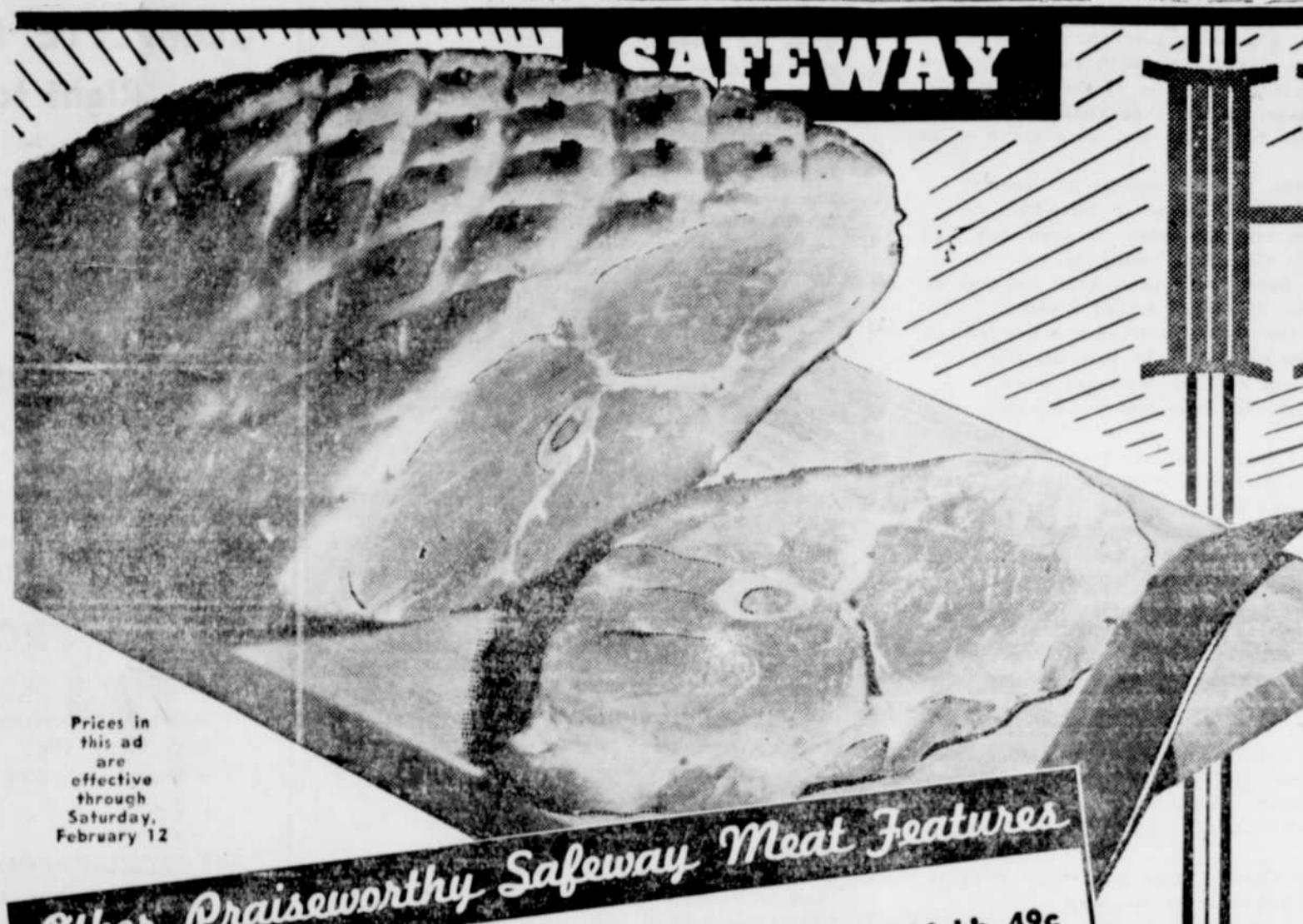
