WILL RISE FROM ASHES

The recent disastrous fire which gutted the Willamette grade school and consumed everything but the concrete foundations, certain plumbing and the heating plant, has forced a decision upon the West Linn school board, according to information from Oregon City.

As soon as weather conditions permit, relates the BANNER COURIER, steps will be taken toward rebuilding of the school plant and architects are already being interviewed to vie for the

task of planning a new structure which will rise from the ashes of the old.

Type of building to be erected has not yet been determined but one thing is certain. The new school will be more fireproof than its predecessor.

COLD WEATHER LAMENT

While, to many of the youngsters of the state, the unreasonable onset of unusual winter weather has meant half-day or full-day vacations, there is a chorus of lament by high school students, in Gresham.

According to the OUTLOOK, it'll take at least an earthquake to enforce an unscheduled high school vacation.

After one Friday afternoon holiday, students on the following Monday morning were somewhat lamenting to note that all school buses came around at the usual time, equipped with chains.

This ability to meet unexpected conditions showed elsewhere in Gresham, too.

Survey of fuel dealers highlighted the fact that a campaign conducted last summer, which urged people to stock up on coal, briquets, wood, oil or sawdust, paid off magnificently. Except for sawdust and coal dealers, none were too hard pressed because of more than normal demands for delivery.

Slight shortages occasionally exist, the dealers report, and will so continue until the cold spell ends. But unless panic runs are made, supply will approximate normal.

PARK OF 100 ACRES

In the realm of parks and recreational activities, the people of McMinnville have a new goal in sight—a development within city limits of 100 acres.

The TELEPHONE REGISTER unveils the plans in telling a preliminary report of a planning consultant.

The proposal will include a nine hole golf course, boat moorages, trails, tennis courts, picnic sites and an outdoor theater in a prospectus befitting a city of 10,000. Present and future facilities of the city's school system are included in the preliminary plans.

The city, at present, has an area of some 55 acres that can be turned to park purposes. In addition, a now vacant and wooded area along Cozine creek is classed "one of the greatest assets" any city of McMinnville's size could have.

Cost of providing adequate operation and maintenance of the facilities proposed is figured at \$3 per person per annum, in normal times. Of this amount, 75c would be earmarked for supervisory and leadership personnel, \$1.50 for operation and maintenance of recreational facilities and 75c for operation and upkeep of the park.

UNAROUSED TAXPAYERS

While, in Vernonia, city revenue of some \$2800 largely slipped from the treasury through this same Columbia county ban, there was abysmal unconcern for a mounting school budget, which called for an added expenditure next fiscal year of some \$13,874.

As reported by the EAGLE, few taxpayers were sufficiently aroused at the increased schooling costs to appear at a school district board meeting for discussion of the new budget.

Total expenditures from July 1, 1949 to June 30, 1950, reach \$142,841, of which \$74,080.75 will be raised by taxation. But school board members figure it doesn't make much difference. Taxpayers don't seem to care, anyway.

Meanwhile, in their slot-machine loss, the city of Vernonia hadn't lost out entirely in revenue. A newly adopted license and operating fee schedule, set up early in January, had brought in \$1000 for license plus the first quarter payment for operating of \$15 per for some 30 machines.

There is, of course, no mention of refund for license and privilege fee for the balance of the year—during which, perhaps, the one-armed highwaymen will remain in hock.

Mr. R. J. Smurthwaite presided. The regular order of business was conducted, then the meeting was turned over to the program chairman Mrs. Thelma Price.

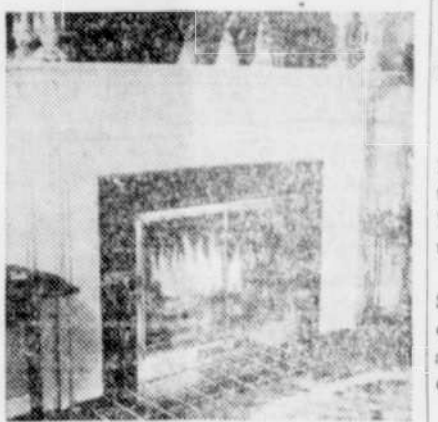
Joe Berger was introduced and gave a talk on the Trophy won by Hazeldale Soft Ball Team last year which was just received.
