At the February meeting of the club the membership voted to raise the price of admission for all persons sixteen years or over. Those under the age of sixteen will still be admitted for the previous price.

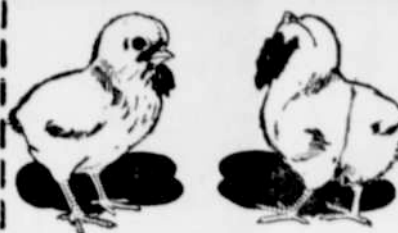
PTA EXEC. BOARD

L-C College Choir Includes 2 From Area in Concerts

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE, Portland—When the college choir leaves February 28 on its concert tour of the Willamette valley and Southern Oregon, Kathleen Imlay of Reedville and John Kirkwood of Beaverton will be among the two busloads of singers. Home town roll call of choir members represents 17 towns in Oregon, Washington and California.

Under the direction of L. Stanley Glarum, 60 singers will give nine concerts in six days. Included in the itinerary will be appearances in Salem, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Lebanon.

Miss Imlay is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Imlay Reedville. In high school she was active in the chorus and other musical groups.

Kirkwood is the son of Mrs. Ida B. Kirkwood, Rt. 2, Beaverton. Besides being a member of the choir, he is a member of the Student Christian association and is the sophomore representative on the student council.

Red Cross Blood Bank to Benefit W. Ore., Wash.

Benefits from blood donated at the new regional Red Cross blood center, to be dedicated February 19 at 2 p.m., will be available to residents of Multnomah county, 10 other counties in Oregon and five nearby counties in Washington.

The dedicatory address will be made by Dr. Ross T. McIntire, national administrator of the Red Cross blood program, who was wartime surgeon-general of the United States Navy and White House physician from 1933 to 1945.

Officials to be present include Governor Douglas, McKay, of Oregon, Dr. Leslie S. Kent, president of the Oregon State Medical society, Dorothy McCullough Lee, mayor of Portland and Raymond H. Barrows, Red Cross vice president and Pacific Area manager. Governor Langlie of Washington, who is unable to attend, is sending a representative.

The Portland regional center is the 20th to be opened by the Red Cross since January, 1948 in a nation-wide plan to provide blood and blood derivatives for everyone. Through the operation of a mobile unit, blood will be collected from communities within a 100-mile radius of Portland.

Open house for public inspection of the center will be held on Sunday from noon to 4 p.m., to enable families attending church, and others interested to see for themselves the personnel, the equipment and the plan of one of the most modern blood centers in the United States. First blood donations will be taken on Monday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., on February 21st.

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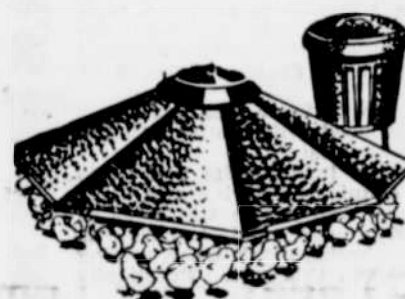
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
