Labor Hits Back At Distortions Re. Solon's Wage

To the Editor:

Outright distortion of the facts recently intended to give the Executive Council of the American Federation of Labor a black eye, when it was reported recently that the AFL favored paying salaries to state Legislators in an attempt to secure favorable labor legislation.

Nothing could be farther from the truth. What Labor did say was this: Legislators deserve better wages for their work in the various state capitols, because higher wages will tend to attract more intelligent and sincere lawmakers. However, Labor never intended to pay these legislators nor even make up the difference between the now low salaries and a more decent living wage.

Labor has always been firmly against rule by the rich. It has fought in many a bloodless revolution throughout the world proving its point that people other than just the wealthy can become capable legislators. Yet, a workman or farmer today has a serious handicap under the present setup. He can't afford to leave his job or farm to spend 60 days or so at a state capitol, unable either to make up the difference or lose money. It is my opinion that we must pay our elected representatives and even office holders a decent wage because in doing so, we attract the best talent to these government positions. We, the people, still have the inalienable right of throwing out bad legislators or any office holder at elections.

If there should be legislation granting increases in salaries to these legislators and office holders, I would consider it a healthy sign, but, if this should happen, we would certainly ask in return, a fair day's work for the added investment.

Dr. Groening hopes that the "have not" nations will benefit from atomic energy first. As yet several obstacles stand in the way of the use of atomic energy for power in small installations such as homes, automobiles, etc., harmful radiation being foremost. Another highlight of the evening was a five minute talk on the life of Kiwanian George Prier by Ray Clearwater.

CHEESE MACARONI RING or LOAF

1/4 to 1/2 pound processed or aged cheddar cheese
1 cup milk
2 beaten eggs
Salt, pepper, scraping of onion, dash of tabasco sauce or cayenne
3 cups cooked macaroni, spaghetti, noodles or rice

Shred cheese or cut into fine piece. Combine milk with beaten eggs and seasonings. Place macaroni, spaghetti, noodles or rice in 8-inch square baking mold or another with the cheese. Pour over the milk and egg mixture. Top with more cheese if you wish. Bake in a moderately slow oven, 325 degrees, for about 40 or 50 minutes or until firm. Unmold onto a hot platter and fill ring with creamed tuna and peas or in a cheese sauce. Serves 4 to 6. Serve with cole slaw and apple pie or cobbler for dessert.
