Boutwell, son-in-law; Mrs. Florence Milne, sister of Mrs. Lambert, and Mrs. May Palmer, Mr. Lambert's sister; Paula Boutwell, 9-year old granddaughter, played Wagner's "Wedding March". Two grandnieces, Joanne LaSalle and Polly Abraham, were flower girls; Mark B. Lloyd, pastor of the First Methodist Church, read an appropriate service.

Charles Q. Lambert is the son of Oregon's pioneers. His mother, born Mary Ellen Covert, was brought to the Willamette Valley country at the age of one year. She is approaching her 90th birthday and lives in Portland with her daughter, Mrs. May Palmer.

Contributing to the early history of Oregon were at least two well-known members of the family. William Odell became Oregon's first surveyor general and later was associated with the governing board of Willamette University. Louis B. Alderman was one time state superintendent of public instruction.

Mrs. Lambert's family were also early settlers, having come to Oregon from Missouri in 1884.

For the past 10 years the couple have lived in and around Beaverton, Oregon, and now reside at 608 S. W. Spencer Avenue.
