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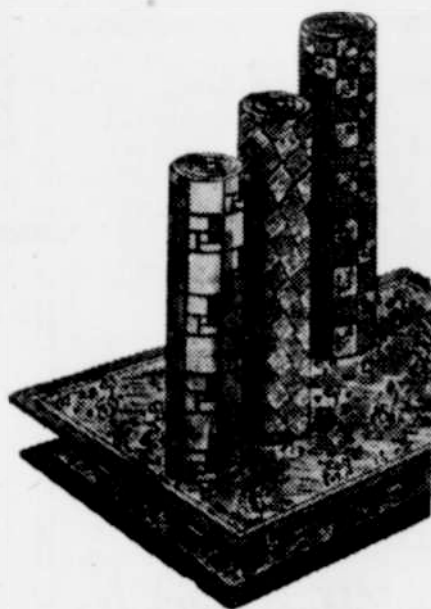
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## MEETING REVEALS IDENTITY OF PAST YEAR'S POLLYANNAS

## SEATTLE JOINS VIDEO PARADE IN BASEBALL

With announcement that its full schedule of home baseball games will be sent out by television, Seattle joins the growing parade of cities in the video sports parade.

A source of added revenue, television results in other centers have indicated that this means of presentation boosts attendance figures even though this might be contrary to expectations.

Fans in the Portland fringe area are believed to be awaiting the establishment of television in the big town and the accompanying broadcast of sight and sound effects of various sporting events.

This hope grows with various auditions for television, which are quietly going along.

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## Beaverton Town Team Defaults In TV Schedule

For the first time in at least three years, according to F. E. Cummings, 415 Walker Road, the Beaverton town team is missing from game schedules drawn up for the Tualatin Valley league of semi-pro baseball teams.

Cummings, who is secretary of the league, points out that for want of a sponsor there will be a full outfit of baseball suits remaining unused in various closets throughout the valley. Last year the IOOF lodge backed the ball club and there were plenty of players competing for the team.

Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Seaside, Verboort, Banks, Gaston, Sheridan and Cornelius are listed on the league roster. First half season begins April 24 and ends June 5 while the second half runs from June 12 to and including July 31.

President of the league is Ray Brooks, Sherlock Building, Portland while Hank McDonald, Banks, is vice president.

An indication of how hard it is for a comparatively small community to get together a baseball team was pointed out by Cummings. He told of Banks and Verboort which got started on the deal and before they were through, they had two teams, one of them in the Tualatin Valley loop and the other in the newly organized Sunset league.

## Oregon Nimrods Return Reports Of Kills By 80%

Final tabulation by the Oregon State Game Commission of return report cards from deer and elk hunters show an eighty per cent return. In comparing this return with those of other states using the same system to secure hunting information, Oregon hunters are revealed as being one of the best groups in the nation in this field of cooperation.

Mr. C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor, pointed out that although this very high percentage of the 163,989 deer hunters and 22,311 elk hunters who bought tags, has cooperated there are still many who have not sent in a report. Mr. Lockwood believes that those who have not reported possibly have lost their report cards or did not understand that they were to report even if they had made no kill. In that the Game division is anxious to have as accurate a picture as possible of last season's kill, all those who have not reported are asked to do so at once. If the report cards have been lost, a letter to the Game Commission will serve the purpose. The letter should contain information as to whether a kill was made or not, the area hunter, the location of the kill, the date of the kill, and the antler class if a kill was made.

Mr. P. W. Schneider, Director of Game for the Commission stated that a complete return is vital to the proper management of the deer and elk herds of the state. He also wished to add his thanks to the many hunters who have already made their returns. It was also pointed out that under the deer tag law those not reporting their 1948 hunt can be refused a tag for the coming season.

Final tabulations show that 36,838 legal buck deer and 4,777 elk were killed during the general seasons last year.

## TIGARD AREA BUSHERS JOIN IN VALLEY LOOP

With the addition of Tigard to the ranks of the Portland Valley semi-pro baseball league, there are now eight communities listed in this department of bush league play.

Full roster includes newly signed Newberg, Willamette, Carlton, Tualatin, Sherwood, Amity and Dayton. The valley circuit has scheduled a meeting at the Sherwood city hall on Monday, March 28 for final determinations of schedules and league eligibility rules.

Bush league fever is quite rampant throughout Western Oregon and hotly-contested town vs. town contests are in the making. League winners compete with similar teams at the end of the season for playoffs designed to establish semi-pro state champions.

Probable date for the state tourney is from July 15 to early August. Game will be played at Westmoreland Park ball diamond.

## KAHUT-BABY DUTCH TO TANGLE AGAIN APR. 5TH

A bout for which he had to outbid promoters from every major boxing center on the Pacific Coast will be presented by Matchmaker Tex Salkeld of the National Boxing Club at the Auditorium in Portland Tuesday night, April 5.

The ace attraction is a ten-round rematch between Joltin' Joe Kahut, the Woodburn agricultural baron, and Baby Dutch Culbertson, young Los Angeles negro.

The two were originally listed for action last week, but recurrence of an injury to Kahut's ailing right arm necessitated a postponement.

The April 5th clash will be the third meeting between the two young heavyweights, who fought a ten-round draw in Seattle before Kahut copped a narrow decision in a 15-round tilt in Portland, judged one of the greatest

heavyweight affairs ever witnessed here.

The contracts specified that both battlers will be on the local scene for training five days before the fight. Culbertson wrote that he has already started drills in Los Angeles, and may come in advance.

Kahut's battle plans, as mapped by Manager Jack Capri, call for him to do road work and preliminary preparation at his Woodburn farm and to launch flistic drills at the Brooklyn Athletic Club late this week.

Salkeld announced that he will fill out the card with a pair of six-round battles and two four-round preliminaries.

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
