Ext. Unit Ladies Attend Lecture On Frozen Foods

"Freezing Precooked and Prepared Foods" was the subject of a demonstration given by Miss Agnes Kolshorn, nutrition specialist Oregon State College Extension Service, at a meeting held in the Episcopal Guild Hall, March 25 with thirty-eight leaders from extension units in the county present.

Miss Kolshorn stated that the recent advances made in methods of freezing foods now make it possible to cook a whole meal and put it in the freezer. School lunches can be packed in a jiffy if you have frozen sandwiches in your freezer.

During the demonstration samples of frozen cake, apple pie, yeast rolls and sandwiches were compared in flavor and texture

with the fresh product.
