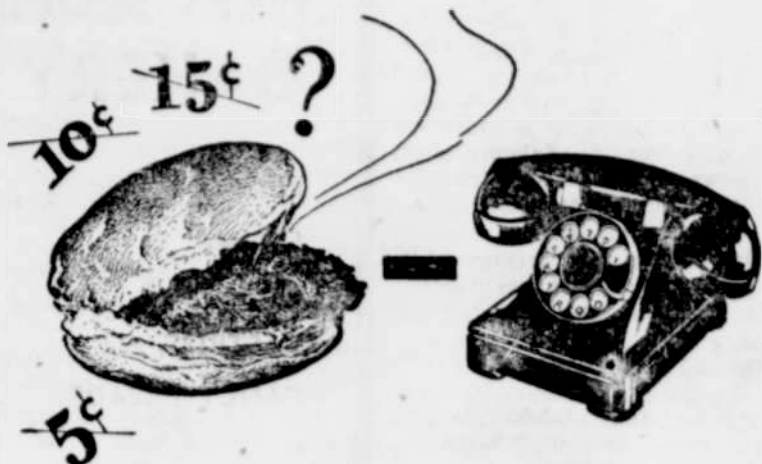


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STUDENTS PRESENT PUPPETS IN "AZTECS' SACRIFICE" SHOW

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Urban League In 4th Annual Meet Welcomes Public

At the fourth annual meeting of the Urban League, in Benson high school, April 3, the general public will be welcomed to a discussion on Portland's position in the national race relations picture. There will be no admission charge and scheduled speakers will participate in a panel discussion touching all phases of race relations.

Irving Enna will preside over the panel. Mayor Dorothy M. Lee will greet the audience.

Inter-racial employment problems will be dealt with by the Very Reverend Vicar-General Thomas Tobin and Shelton Hill, industrial secretary of the league.

Specific and general aspects of community housing and the bearing it has on race relations will be explained and presented by Mark Smith and Helen Catlin. Mrs. Catlin is retiring president of the Portland Housing Planning association.

Rabbi Appelbaum will discourse on religion as it applies to the matter of racial developments while the public's responsibility will be outlined by Mary Catherine Davis.

Dr. Myron C. Cole, pastor of the First Christian church and chairman of the mayor's committee on race relations will share an explanation of the law's effect in relations between races with Ulysses G. Plummer, chairman of the legal redress committee, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.
