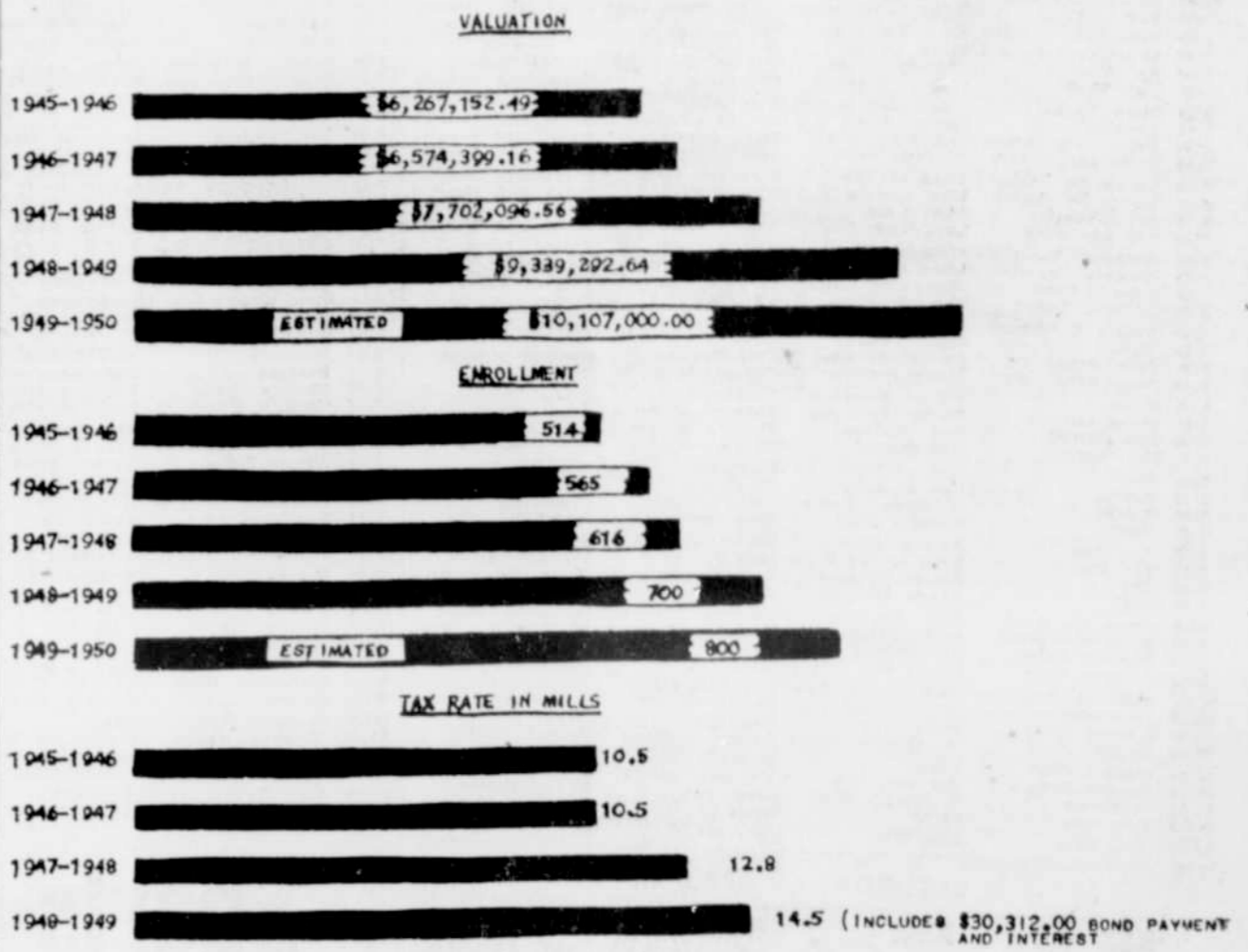

DEPICTING THE GROWTH SINCE 1945, 1949, shows the Beaverton school levy figure well below all others in the county. I. R. Metzler, superintendent of the high school, declares that the school board has diligently studied the known increases of population and have reluctantly concluded there is no other answer than further construction. To be built will be a combination auditorium-gymnasium, new science, home economics and musical department and as many class rooms as careful use of the money provided will allow.

Except for the first year, district levies for the high school were lowest of all county schools and the only exception was in comparison with Banks. Average for four years from—1945 to

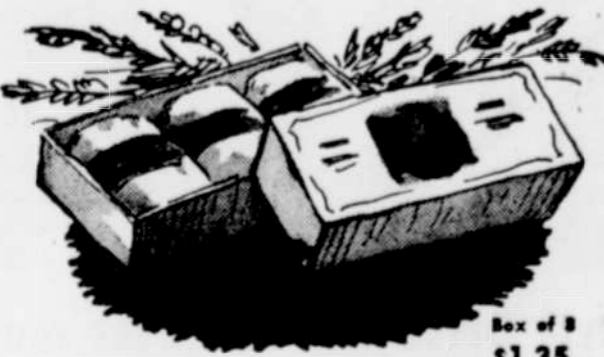

Miss Mina Jacobson and Mesdames Bertha P. Anderson and Iris C. Pipley were accepted into membership.

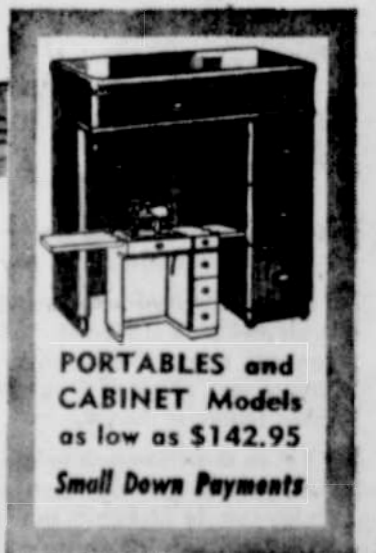
