**Taggart Demonstrates New Method**



**LATEST METHOD OF BUILDING CONSTRUCTION** is demonstrated here by Paul Taggart, of United Builders, Beaverton, as pre-poured concrete slabs are being raised for the new Poulin Furniture store, located on Canyon Road at Mill Street, Beaverton.

Slabs are poured on the building site and raised by crane to positions on concrete footing. Electric conduit is put in at time of pouring and the walls are heavily reinforced by steel bars and 10 gauge steel mesh.

A big savings is made in the time required for construction under this method. Outside of slabs are finished in stucco and ready for paint application as soon as in place. This is the same construction method as used in the Beaverton Post office building. Cost is set at half that of ordinary re-inforced concrete walls and approximates 80 cents per square foot.

Each slab has a 2" by 2" grouting pocket on

each end which, when in position, is filled with a mixture of iron filings and cement. Rust and heat action due to the iron filings, causes the mixture to expand, making a solid connection.

On the bottom of the slab, also, there are grouting pockets for joining to the footing. On top, the grouting is in addition to a steel rod running the perimeter of the building wall.

At each corner, 1/2" by 4" steel plates are bolted through the slabs to add stability. Steel hangers are poured into the slabs upon which may be placed either wooden or structural steel joists. Any type of roof is permitted.

As the walls can be poured at a thickness from four inches, Taggart says, they will fit in nicely with home building plans.
