RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE S. W. FIRST STREET

WHEREAS, 75% of the property owners abutting on S. W. First Street have petitioned the City Council to initiate and institute the necessary proceedings for the improvement thereof from Watson Street to Stott Street, and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to institute the necessary proceedings to have the said improvement performed,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF BEAVERTON That the City of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, proceed to improve S. W. First Street within the City on the following portion thereof:

Beginning at a point on the center line of S. W. First Street where the center line of Watson Street intersects with said center line; thence westerly along the center line of S. W. First Street to a point on the center line of Stott Street where the same intersects with the center line of S. W. First Street.

By regrading and applying leveling courses of rock and paving with bituminous asphalt hard wearing surface to a width of 40 feet, being 20 feet on each side of said center line, and installing curbs on each side of said S. W. First Street, leaving a width of traveling surface of 40 feet, said work to be done by contract; storm sewer and sanitary sewer and water mains to be installed before said street is improved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That the cost of said improvements be assessed against the abutting property as provided by the ordinances and charter of the City of Beaverton.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That a written objection or remonstrance to said street improvement be filed at any time on or before 8:00 p.m. on April 18, 1949, at the City Hall in Beaverton, Oregon.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That the recorder is authorized to give notice of this resolution in the time and manner provided by the charter and ordinances of the City of Beaverton, that the City Recorder shall serve notice of such improvements as required by the ordinances and in the manner therein set forth.
