

A. R. Ringe Explains Parity In Farmers' Union Address

PROGRAM USES PRICE EXPERIENCE PERIOD
1914-1920 FOR ESTABLISHING SUPPORT BASIS

A. R. Ringe, president of Cedar Mill Local 229, in a Farmer's Educational and Cooperative Union of America radio broadcast over radio station KOAC, Corvallis, on March 30, cited the important bearing on the lives of farmers of the parity price program. In a carefully prepared speech, Mr. Ringe traced the history of the price support movement and justified the contribution it makes.

Parity, as Ringe defined it, means equality in purchasing power between prices that are paid and prices that are asked. The difference between a good parity price program and none at all, he declared, would be bankruptcy for the small farmer.

According to the speech, the need for a leveling influence on the income of small farmers, particularly, was first recognized at the end of the first World War.

Experience then showed that while farm prices had increased faster during the war than most other commodities, they dropped faster and deeper in 1920 and 1921. From this experience arose considerable agitation for some form of agricultural relief.

Almost without exception, Ringe pointed out, the ideas written into the Agricultural Marketing act of 1929, the Agricultural Adjustment act of 1933, the Agricultural Marketing Agreement act of 1937 and the Agricultural Adjustment act of 1938 can all

be traced back to the recognition of need as accepted nationwide during 1921 and 1922.

"Taking the country as a whole," Ringe continued, "half the farmers sell 90% of all that is sold. The other half sell but 10%. For this latter half, who are low income farmers, something more than parity prices is necessary if they are to have what we call decent living standards."

"You take the farmer. Many of them have a cash income of \$100 a year. They have poor houses, poor diet, no sanitary facilities. It seems to me, personally, that some of the effort of the government should be directed towards helping in addition to this."
