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Businessmen Adopt Policy On Charity Contributions

MEETING STILL STRESSES BEAVERTON'S NEED OF
DAYTIME COP IN SOLUTION OF STREET PROBLEM

Hereafter there will be no contributions in the name of Charity by Beaverton businessmen unless the seekers for funds have cleared their project through a committee of the BMA, it was voted at the last meeting of the association, held in Kiwanis Hall on April 21. A committee of Leonard Adams, Chet Hunkapillar and Bob Holland will draw up specific plans for the move.

The meeting went stoutly on record as still believing that a daytime policeman is necessary in properly solving street problems of parking and traffic violations.

The Businessmen's Association has about completed making of two all-day, off-street parking sites for free use by the public. To advertise this fact to habitual long-time parkers on the main streets of the city, the group voted to have courtesy tickets printed to advise drivers of the areas specially prepared to relieve street congestion.

In the matter of daytime police,

the meeting suggested changing hours of the present officer to include 4 p.m., during which time a check might be made on long-time parkers.

The financial committee, by another action of the group, is empowered to meet with the city council before the setup of the next budget. The delegation will present recommendations for a city police car and better police protection in time for it to be considered in the budget for the coming fiscal year.

The meeting voted to draft a city-wide schedule for holidays to be observed under Mayor's proclamation. Appointed for that committee were Harry Truesdell, chairman, Harold Miller and Al Higbee.

Don Jenkins agreed to assist Miller in another task, collection of membership fees for the association from those merchants and businessmen south of the railroad track.

Just before adjournment, the assemblage voted heartily in favor of daylight saving time.

Beaverton Time Confusion Might Be Clarified May 2

COUNTY COURT ADOPTS DAYLIGHT SAVING WHILE
P. O. AND STAGE LINES REFUSE TO MAKE CHANGE

The clock-juggling parade started by the city of Portland and reluctantly accepted by most of the surrounding area has clouded Beaverton time with confusing aspects. But, according to Mayor H. H. Jeffries, some clarification of the situation may officially be made at the next meeting of the city council, May 2.

The Beaverton Businessmen's Association, declaring no other choice seemed logical, voted in heavy majority, April 21, to switch to the one-hour earlier clock schedule. By this action, all business houses in the city generally fell in line with the movement.

Meanwhile, Oregon Motor Stages have not budged from their standard-time schedules. Monday morning, commuters along Farmington Road had to walk over to Canyon Road before they could catch a bus which, on an alternate schedule, would have accommodated them at the usual bus stop according to standard time.

Motor Stages officials point out that Portland's summer time schedule throws them into a tizzy. Transcontinental buses keep to standard time and the Oregon transportation concern finds it can do nothing else—according to present views.

Postoffice service, likewise, continues on the standard time level. At Beaverton, deliveries are made about 10:30 a.m., 4:20 p.m. and midnight. Evening dispatch of mail is scheduled about 6:30 p.m.

Farmers are gravely concerned at the time-twisting which cuts one hour from their available day's time in reaching the market for sales and purchases as well.

In its last regular meeting, the Beaverton city council set aside any action on the change, due to the pending law which may or may not go into effect in July and which will set the policy of no daylight saving time other than on a state-wide basis.

Meanwhile, whether they want to or not, most households have set timepieces ahead one hour and the quitting time for wage slaves comes along even before the setting sun has dipped low towards the western horizon.

In Washington county, Judge Herman D. Kerkman has announced that the courthouse will officially observe daylight saving time, keeping in tune with Hillsboro and other Washington Co. towns.

Sewer Construction Hangs On Bond Setup Acceptance

Construction of Beaverton's sanitary sewage disposal system hangs on acceptance of the city bond setup by John W. Shuler, legal bond authority, according to L. J. Busse, city recorder. In a telephone conversation with Shuler, last Monday, Busse outlined the grave problem of Beaverton's high sub-surface water level and stressed the need of taking advantage of the comparatively dry season for the installation. He declares that Shuler offered to proceed with his investigation of the Beaverton bond issue with all possible speed.

The provision of available blood for use in all emergencies, regardless of race, creed, color or ability to pay has become a matter of primary importance in public health.
