IN SURROUNDING NORTHWEST COMMUNITIES

SQUIRRELY MATTER

An impassioned outburst against squirrels occupied the St. Helens city council recently.

As reported by the SENTINEL-MIST, it was a serious matter, this squirrel invasion which was threatening property and even human lives. All those present at the deliberations had plenty to say.

The reporter covering the session remarked that he was beginning to build up a rather dread picture of what he had once figured a rather chummy creature that, on occasion, might eat a peanut from his hand—if properly coaxed.

But the great white light finally dawned on the reporter when it was pointed out that the squirrels referred to the rather maniacal young wranglers of hot-rods who defy all laws of reason in pursuing their pleasure.

FISH HARVEST

The annual harvest of an unusual fish will soon be in full swing at Oregon City.

The BANNER COURIER tells of the beginning project aimed at trapping migratory lamprey for oil reduction purposes.

The spring run of these high-volume, low-vitamin oil-bearing creatures is underway and the harvest will utilize traps, sluices, boats and other gear. The work is done privately under cooperative arrangement with the state game commission.

WATER RATES UP

Maybe the air is still free in McMinnville. But the costs of water is going up.

The TELEPHONE-REGISTER previews increased rates for city water service, due to start May 1. Excuse for the boosts, furthermore, are not to offset increased costs of labor and materials.

The new schedule is imposed primarily to simplify accounting and to correct existing inequalities and discourage unnecessary waste.

The special summer sprinkling rate will be discontinued. This customary vacation from regular water rates during hot months, to encourage greener lawns and city beautification, is cited as "contrary to all business principles" inasmuch as it creates an excessive demand on supply and facilities.

OUTDOOS TOM SAWYER

Residents in Oswego have long noted the immaculate yard of one citizen and wondered how he was able to keep it up in such good shape.

The REVIEW lets the secret out of the bag. "Slave labor," it relates, does the trick. By another viewpoint, however, it seems that the home-owner has merely hit upon a scheme to outdo Mark Twain's Tom Sawyer in the matter of getting help.

Latest victims of the crazy shenanigans, it tells, were two players on the Lucky Beavers baseball team who had a yen to go fishing. The various chores required to put his place in top shape, the home owner said, was all that prevented his taking the ball players to sure-bet fishing holes.

As a result, the young athletes turned to and finished a multitude of jobs. Reward included one 18-pounder for one of the ball players—the first he had ever snagged.

DAYLIGHT SWITCH

By an estimated 75%, the people of Gresham are reported to favor a juggling of the clock for switch to daylight saving time.

The OUTLOOK took a fast survey up and down the street and came up with the quite safe prediction that the city council would make it official.

DOUBLE SALE

The district of Sellwood gained by an act of double salesmanship.

The BEE, announcing a new advertising manager, relates that the man operating his own advertising agency in southern California, was subject to many sales talks on the merits of living in Oregon, by the young lady he was courting.

In return, the man exerted his sales talk on the matter of marriage. Both won and now, Mr. and Mrs., the couple have taken their place in this Oregon community.

AIRPORT ASKED

In the annual report of the civil aeronautics administration is the recommendation that Vernonia be favored with installation of a Class I airport.

The EAGLE says such a strip

calls for from 1800 to 2700 feet in runway, take-off space.

For Columbia county, two class 1 airports are asked. Cost on the statewide development which lists 96 air facilities needed, is estimated at \$17,143,002, of which the federal government will provide \$9,172,000.

STREET REPAIR

Repair or complete loss is the streets ultimatum handed down by the city engineer of McMinnville.

A plan, outlined in the TELEPHONE REGISTER, would restore all of the city's paved streets at an estimated cost of \$120,000. This, it is pointed out, means the upkeep of a municipal investment set at \$800,000, set as the value of the street system.

For payment of the improvement, the city reveals, it will "probably" be at no direct cost to taxpayers. A bond issue would have to be voted by the public but these bonds would be retired by use of the city's share of state highway revenues, expected to run in excess of \$20,000 per year.

CORN STATESMANSHIP

In La Grande, there should be a great deal of discussion in the matter of corn statesmanship.

An editorial in the EASTERN OREGON REVIEW thoroughly kicks around the bottle necks at the state legislature which has kept them on the job dealing with such problems as the ban on eating pop-corn in the theater.

Pointed up is the threat of a future evil of juvenile delinquency by encouragement of boys and girls who might smuggle in or bootleg their own pop-corn and peanuts at a movie house. Of the youngsters who might be dragged out of a showhouse with their pockets guiltily spilling kernels of the forbidden corn, the editorial says, "Think of the disgrace that will come to the poor parents of children so charged."

There is no telling, it points out, what statesmanship might accomplish!

BEAR HUNT GOES ON

A small bear hunt is going on by a tavern owner in Forest Grove.

According to the NEWS-TIMES the pub manager had managed to get a three-months old bear but three roughly dressed characters allegedly put the glom on the animal.

The three bear-snatchers were trailed into Portland, where they were reported to have stopped at taverns along the way to show off their illegal prize.

Value of the pet is set at \$500.

READIES BID CALL

In Hillsboro, steps are being readied for a call for bids on the proposed gymnasium.

By word of the ARGUS, specification details should be ironed out by now, with call for bids by May 1. Construction, it is hoped, should begin by the latter part of May.

HILLSBORO TELEVISION

The flickering image of a video program has been reported at Hillsboro.

News of the event is carried by the ARGUS, which relates that a news reel, cartoon, historical sketch on London as of 1850 plus commercials. The visual signals were said to be generally good but the accompanying sound was spotty.

Used to snag the impulses from the air was a 25 foot antenna with booster. Conditions designated as ideal for reception were the warm day and a brewing storm. An overcast sky, it is stated, seems to reflect the video signals.

SPRING BUILDING

Spring broke with a hearty upsurge of home building in Gresham.

According to the OUTLOOK, of the \$64,500 in building permits during the month of March \$43,000 were for the building of new homes.
