DAYLIGHT TIME

It's official! From 2 a.m. standard time, Tuesday morning, May 3, Beaverton has been on daylight saving time, as a result of council action taken May 2.

In other words, at 2 a.m. standard time, it was really 3 a.m. daylight saving time. This means there was really no 2 a.m. Tuesday. Did anybody miss it?

Oh well, maybe you get the drift of it all!

VACATION MONEY

Four weeks of vacation time, which has been accumulating for L. J. Busse, city recorder, since 1947, will be paid out in lieu of time off.

He's so snowed under, he reports, that utter confusion would reign, were he to absent himself for the allowed time.

COMFORT STATION

Bids will soon be called for the much discussed comfort station, provided for in the current budget as an addition to the city park.

Plans and estimated costs were presented to the council. Construction will be of cement and as soon as blueprints have been made bids will be asked.

BOND REFUNDING

Motion to call in \$7500 in improvement bonds was passed by the council Monday. Issue is the 1939 improvement bonds.

BUDGET APPOINTMENT

The city council was informed that Jay Gibson, of the First Security Bank, does not wish to serve on the 1949-50 city budget committee and in his place was appointed Albert Rossi.

PETITION BY 100%

The best property owners on Mill street could do, with their petition for improvement of the road surface from the highway to Beaverton road, was 100%.

Requested is grade, gravel and blacktop with curb on the east side of the street. Arthur J. Pouline, owner of the new store building at Mill street and the highway, intends to blacktop his property from the road edge to the building.

The city attorney was instructed to take necessary steps for the improvement.

INSURANCE PAYMENT

The sum of \$76.40 for insurance on chief of police Henry Mayfield's car was ordered paid by the council.

This amount represents the additional cost of insuring the vehicle because of its use as a city police car.

SAND HOG EPISODE

Beaverton's version of a sand hog episode is about to conclude.

Due to the widening of Canyon Road, all city water lines had to be lowered to a specified depth. The city dept. has thus been wholly occupied with the task of drilling tunnels beneath the highway.

And they are short-handed, too.

ANY KIND OF ROAD

Three property owners on S. W. Berthold Ave., appearing before the council, asked for any kind of a road that would enable them to get in and out.

They were advised to circulate a petition.

NINTH ST. MIXUP

The determination of the city to improve 9th street property runs into another mixup.

Original property owners, it seems, sold their land up to the accepted road right of way but retained title to the road itself. Now widows, children and other dependents of original owners are not all cooperative in turning over these titles.

It's a technical point and the city attorney was authorized to bring suit against them to quiet title and permit the improvement.

SIGN BOARD RULING

Outdoor advertising signs will pay a \$6 license fee, \$12 occupation tax plus building permit, by action taken through an ordinance passed.

It's effective at once.

Cpl. Bud Yeomans

Corporal Gerald Reese (Bud) Yeomans will be laid to his final rest in a vault at Riverview Abbey, Saturday, May 7th at 10:30 a.m.

The service will be conducted by the Reverend Russell Thomas of the Canyon Road Baptist Church. Holman and Lutz will be in charge of the arrangements. Pallbearers will be some of his old buddies of the 104th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop.

Corporal Yeomans was a member of the 104th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop (Mec) since its activation into the Timberwolf Division at Camp Adair in 1943. He served in the Army from Dec. 1942 until April 17, 1945, when he was killed in action while his Unit was on one of its final operations before V-E Day.

Corporal Yeomans was born on January 22, 1920 in Oakland, Cal. moved to Portland, Oregon with his parents in Sept., 1928. He attended Portland Grade Schools and graduated from Franklin high school in the class of June 1939. He was an active member of Portland Rose Tent-Hive No. 1, The Maabees and Local 48 of the Electrical Workers Union.

He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Ray E. Yeomans of Beaverton; two brothers, Ray E. Yeomans Jr. of Beaverton and Arnold W. Yeomans of Portland; two sisters, Mrs. Geneva Yoder and Mrs. Evelyn DeFigure both of Portland.
