Fifty Events in 3rd Int'l Meet

Entry blanks are available at any Plymouth dealer, for the third international model plane contest at Detroit Aug. 22-28, according to announcement by the Plymouth Motor Corporation. Participation will be open to boys and girls in four different age groups: junior 14 and 15; senior, 16 to 20 and open, 21 to 25.

Awards include 167 trophies and \$8,750 in U. S. Savings Bonds.

Contest is invitational, with bids going to model builders throughout the world who have established records in preliminary local and state contests, likewise sponsored by Plymouth dealers.

In last year's contest, the company reports, seven national records for endurance and speed were set. Some 925,000 spectators watched the 208 dealer-sponsored contests in which about 25,000 model builders participated. A record crowd of 62,000 attended finals in Detroit.

The third international event will feature 50 indoor and outdoor events. Range of models will be from those powered with rubber bands, for inside use, to the jet-propelled models flown on control lines.

SHIPMENT TO FRANCE

A package of food shipped through the CARE organization at Christmas time and addressed to "Newspaperman with infant child" has been well received in Paris, France, according to a letter received by Michael Kain, 1001 S. E. Franklin street, Beaverton.

The thank you letter was sent from Paris on April 17 and says, in part, "It is very nice to you thinking of us in Europe. We had a great pleasure with all the delicious things you sent us."

The letter writer, M. R. Pieron, is economical and financial editor of the newspaper "Le Figaro" and "some times reporter". Quite an interesting job, he explains.

Enclosed were snapshots of the man and wife and Philip, first born. Married two years ago, they also have two boys who were born in January, just one year later than their eldest.

"Do you know Paris?" the letter asks. "It is a beautiful place and we have a lovely weather in that moment. Many foreign tourists arrive for Easter holidays and we can see the first of your fellow countrymen driving their magnificent cars."

"Maybe you will come here someday and we would be happy to meet you, unless we go to U. S. before, but it is quite improbable."

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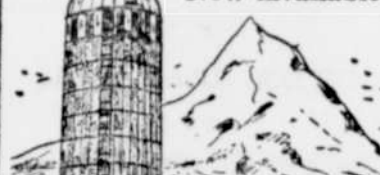
