PAC. UNIVERSITY CENTENNIAL OFFERS MAMMOTH PAGEANT

FOREST GROVE—A mammoth 16 scene historical pageant requiring a cast of 300 to 400 persons will be the featured attraction during Centennial Week scheduled for September 19-25, 1949 at Forest Grove, Oregon, according to Frank C. Brodersen, president of Centennial Inc., a non-profit organization formed to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Pacific University and the Forest Grove section of the Tualatin Plains.

The gigantic Centennial production will be presented on a 175 foot stage with hundreds of props including horses, wagons, and 300 appropriate costumes especially brought in from Hollywood.

Community organizations and social clubs will have an opportunity to participate in the pageant through a "cast auction" plan whereby various local groups will provide the principals for each of the show's 16 scenes. Adults and children alike, will be

called upon to take some part in this ambitious civic project designed and dedicated as a tribute to Living and Learning... the Community and the University... together through these past 100 years.

Selection of a Centennial Queen to rule over the anniversary celebration is expected to stimulate a great deal of interest and enthusiasm throughout the entire Tualatin Plains area. Complete details regarding the method of selecting the Centennial Queen and royal court will be announced early this summer.

In addition to the historical pageant and queen selection activities, the executive board of Centennial Inc. plans to transform the city of Forest Grove into one great Exposition of Progress. All retail stores and business firms will be urged to set-up special window displays comparing their products and/or services of today with their 1849 equivalents.

Two ultra-modern, streamlined homes, "Centennial" and "Pacific" houses, will be completed and open for public inspection sometime late this summer. Both houses will be completely equipped with all the latest labor saving devices and the interior decoration and furnishings will reportedly represent the last word in liveable luxury, beauty and utility.

A great outdoors exposition with displays and personnel from nearby Army, Air Force and National Guard installations, will be offered in Portland, May 12-15 inclusive, at Lloyd's Addition, Holladay Park district. The show is open to the public of all ages from 2 to 10 p. m. with no admission charged.

General Mark W. Clark, commanding general of the 6th army, will formally open the presentation. Special ceremonies marking the opening will include an air armada furnished by the Oregon National Guard.

Purpose of the Army Show is to encourage recruits by showing the educational and career opportunities available in armed forces duty. Demonstrations of most recent equipment, including some never before revealed to the public, are scheduled.

Partial list of exhibits include food service mobile classrooms; quartermaster equipment issues and service facilities; complete F-51 fighter plane; engineer's models of bridges; display of recreation and athletic devices for the soldier; showing of chemical warfare devices; mobile radar set; signal corps paraphernalia; army correspondence courses; information and education programs; chaplain's exhibit for each major faith and actual war trophies in both World Wars.

Law Says to Stop When School Bus Loads or Unloads

Oregon's new law requiring motorists to stop when encountering a school bus that is loading or unloading children is now in effect, the department of state police reminded today.

The law, passed at the last session of the state legislature, makes it mandatory to stop when approaching from either direction a school bus halted on a two-lane roadway. Vehicles must remain stopped "if and so long

as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the highway." Only vehicles approaching a stopped bus from the opposite direction while on a highway having more than two lanes are exempted from the stopping requirement, officials explained. Drivers on three or four-lane roadways must stop when approaching a school bus halted on their side of the road.

The law applies to all roads, streets and highways, whether in cities or rural areas.

Initial enforcement will consist of warnings for all but flagrant violators, state police said. Arrests will be made for later offenses.

TAXES and TELEPHONES
