Heart Strain in Old Age Raises Blood Pressure

When you warn an excited person, "Watch your blood pressure, you are not only using a popular expression; you are literally pointing out to him that the pressure of blood in his arteries is being increased by his emotional upset, whether it be excitement, anger, fear or anxiety.

Blood pressure can be increased by the heart's beating faster or by a narrowing down of the smaller blood vessels through which the blood is pumped. Thus, everyone's blood pressure is constantly changing within certain limits, depending on whether a person is resting or physically active, emotionally calm and relaxed or excited and under tension.

It is perfectly normal for a person's blood pressure to be "high" when he runs, for example, or climbs stairs or is emotionally worked up. It is when blood pressure stays more or less constantly at a high level that a person is said to have "high blood pressure."

A person may have abnormally high blood pressure and live a normal life for many, many years. If the pressure gets too great there is the danger that one of the vessels might burst. One artery in the brain is weaker than most and this is the one most likely to give way, resulting in what is commonly called a "stroke."

Laura E. Holcomb

Mrs. Laura E. Holcomb of 633 N. E. Broadway, Beaverton, passed away on April 29th. Services were held at the Beaverton Methodist Church on Monday, May 2 at 2 p.m.

She was the widow of the late Rev. Wilson Sumner Holcomb who passed away in 1917. Interment was in Lincoln Memorial Park, Portland, at the side of her husband. The Rev. Mark B. Lloyd officiated at the services and he was assisted by Dr. Oliver Gill, Methodist District Supt. of the Forest Grove District.

Mrs. Holcomb was born on June 25th, 1862 in Wayne County, Indiana. She had lived in Oregon since 1880 and was prominent throughout this country in assisting her husband in his ministerial duties while he was alive. She moved to Beaverton in 1920.

She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Corabelle Walker and her son, Wilbur S. Holcomb, both of Beaverton; a brother, James R. Van Brunt lives in Spokane, Wash. There are 7 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Road Accidents Involved Every Sixth Licensee

One out of every six holders of an Oregon driver's license was involved in a traffic accident last year, the secretary of state's traffic safety division said today.

Statewide records show 127,768 drivers were involved in accidents during 1948, 9,471 more than during the first postwar year of 1946 and an all-time high. Over half were guilty of a traffic law violation at the time of the mishap, the record reveals.

Most of the accident drivers were Oregon residents with six years or more driving experience.

Vets in School Granted New VA Ruling on Leave

Two major changes in leave policies affecting veterans enrolled under the G. I. Bill in job-training establishments or in schools below the college level have been announced by the Veterans Administration.

Effective immediately, the VA said veterans will be allowed to apply for 15 days leave at the end of their period of enrollment in addition to whatever leave was taken while in training.

The second change of VA policy places full responsibility for the granting of leaves of absence to G. I. students during training upon the school or employer-trainer, within a maximum of 30 days yearly.

Veterans will be granted leave at the completion of their period of enrollment only if they have enough entitlement to education or training to cover it, the VA emphasized.

Periods of enrollment for on-the-job training and in short, intensive courses usually include the entire extent of the training course. Enrollment periods for veterans in schools below college level most commonly are the ordinary school years.

 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed bids will be received by the undersigned until the hour of 8 o'clock p.m., the 16th day of May, 1949, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the District School Board of Union High School District No. 10 Jt., Washington and Multnomah Counties, at Beaverton Union High School building, in the City of Beaverton, Oregon, for an issue of bonds of said District in the sum of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), said bonds to be in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each, dated July 1, 1949, and maturing serially in numerical order at the rate of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) on the 1st day of July in each of the years 1952-1961 inclusive; provided, however, that all bonds which mature after July 1, 1957 shall be subject to call and redemption on any interest paying date after July 1, 1957, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, payable semiannually, principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, or at the office of the County Treasurer of Washington County, Oregon, at the option of the successful bidder.
