The Tarawans wear only breech cloths, but they love to accept stray or discarded articles of clothing from navy men and drape them about their bodies in any haphazard fashion.

At one time, Mr. Harrell asked a group of natives to toss aside some of their make-shift finery so that he could get a picture of them as they would naturally appear. All gladly obliged except one young lady. The interpreter explained that it was customary for young women who are betrothed to cover themselves entirely, until after the marriage ceremony. On special occasions, such as holidays, the women wear grass skirts.

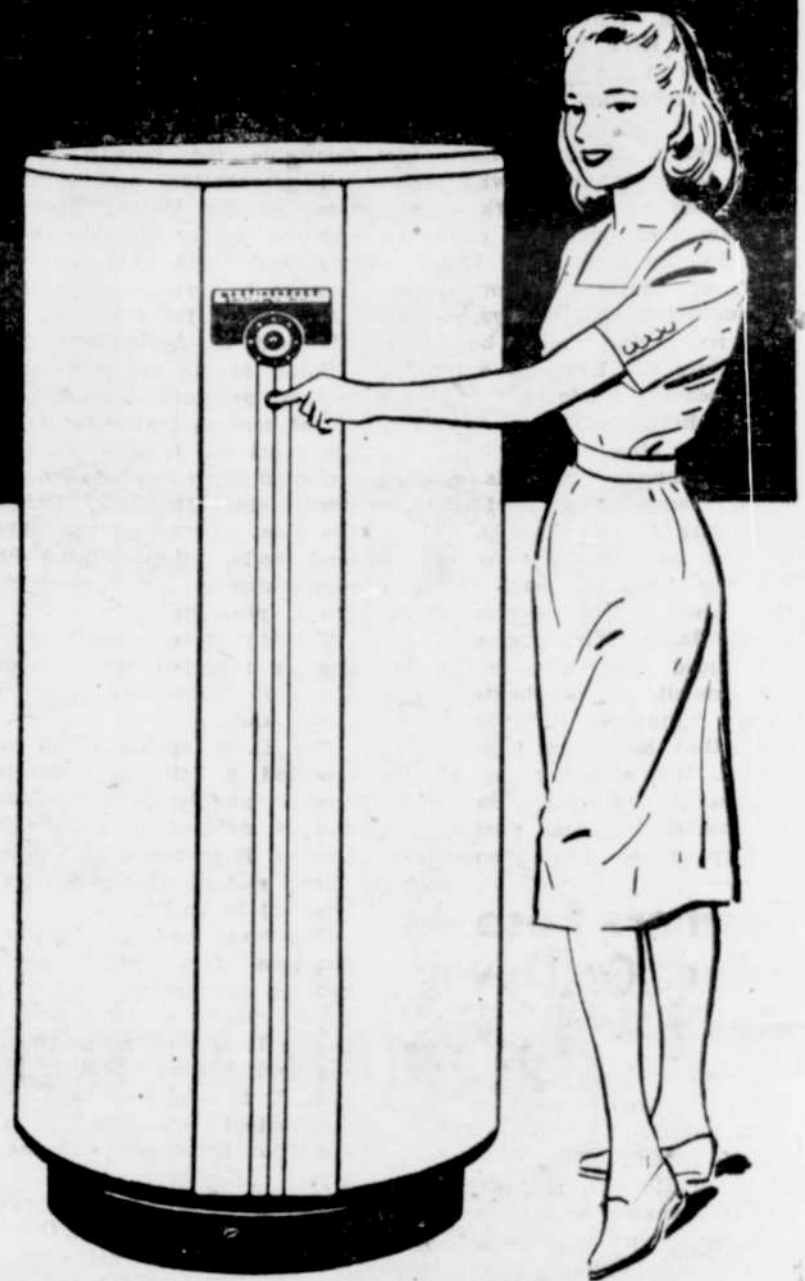
