Beaverton Uses Athletic Field For Graduation

With 139 seniors set for graduation, Beaverton union high school announces that it will hold commencement exercises on its athletic field, May 26, starting at 8 p.m. Daylight Saving Time. With such a large class, the school has no adequate room in which the exercises may be properly held, declares I. R. Metzler, superintendent.

Each graduate will be allotted 3 tickets which will admit parents or friends to the covered grandstand. General admission bleachers will be set up on the other side of the athletic field and the general public is cordially invited to attend the ceremonies. They may bring blankets (and food) to the picnic.

Meanwhile, Metzler announces that the proposed building program, for which \$300,000 in bonds were recently approved, will first provide science, home economics and four additional class rooms. No immediate action will be taken on construction of the auditorium-gymnasium until the first phase of the building is completed.

drivers were involved in accidents during 1948, 9,471 more than during the first postwar year of 1946 and an all-time high. Over half were guilty of a traffic law violation at the time of the mishap, the record reveals. Most of the accident drivers were Oregon residents with six years or more driving experience.
